2½-Cent City Tax Increase Seen

Employes Seek Social Security Plan

A 21/2-cent increase in the city's tax rate per \$100 of asssed valuation may be forth-

This will happen in case city employes decide that they wish to participate in the Federal Social Security program.

Such a move will have to be approved by the City Council and a formal vote of the employes, according to City Manager George Stevens.

Stevens said the tax increase ould be necesary for the city's contribution to the Old Age Survivors' Insurance system.

Under the plan, the city would match the employe con-

Stevens said that representatives of city employes, exclusive of policemen and firemen, have indicated that the workers wish to be covered by Social Security addition to the state plan.

Currently 9.4 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation of the total municipal tax rate goes for the city's contribution to the state retirement pension system for municipal employes.

EDITORIAL

The Pool Needs a Roof

Last year Torrance obtained its swimming pool. The pool has been a tremendous recreational asset to the community—and still it is not all that it could be. Because it is an open-air pool, it is used only during the summer months, its use during the rest of the year being highly restricted.

It is unfortunate and unrealistic that such a costly investment cannot be used to its full potential. The ideal pool is one which can double as an in-

door pool during the fall and an outdoor pool during the summer. By providing a sliding roof for the Torrance

pool, the facility could be used the year around. Cost of such a roof has been estimated at \$300,-000. It seems to us that it is better to do something right than not to do it at all or only half-way.

A good all-year swimming pool would make it possible for groups such as the schools, YMCA, YWCA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and others to hold instructional classes.

Giving youngsters a chance to learn how to swim and to be instructed in the rules of water safety is one of the main purposes of a municipal swimming pool and would be the justification for the expense
