ACCUSED KIDNAPER OUT ON Blast Kills NABBED AS BURGLAR Worker One man was decapitated

Only days before he was to go on trial for his life on a kidnaping charge, Coy Lee Hall, 25, of Torrance, was arrested on suspicion of burglarizing a Long Beach service station Sunday.

Hall, who, together with two other persons, faces a possible death sentence for kidnaping a Torrance service station operator December 21, was arrested inside the Wallick, Inc. service station, 1355 W. Pacific

Arrested with him was Clay Trice Thomas, 44, of 2005 240th st., Lomita, an ex-convict who has served terms in San Quentin and Folsom prisons for burglary.

Russo was met at his truck by a man and woman, both armed. who forced him to go with them in the truck, according to police.

After taking the money from him, they forced him out of the vehicle in the 20800 block of Denker st.

Police say Hall "masterminded" the plot but that Bonina and Mrs.

The kidnaping charge alleges that they subjected Russo to "great bodily harm." Penalty for that offence is death or life imprisonment without possible parole.

In the Sunday morning service station burglary, Hall and Thomas were discovered by Special Officer Robert Hawkins, who heard pounding inside the building and notified police.

Hawkins said he saw a man, believed to have been Thomas, inside

The Torrance City Council will have to make a serious decision shortly: Whether to increase taxes or decrease services.

If the city is to continue giving proper services to its residents, taxes will have to go up 30 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. So stated City Manager George Stevens last

The present tax rate of \$1.184 would go up to

This would amount to about \$3.40 per year more

which the average GI homeowner would have to pay. Costs of an election in April 1958 (\$50,000), purchase of rubbish collection equipment, hiring of 60 employes to keep up with the city's growth, and development of three parks and playgrounds acquired during the past two years are among the projects for which the additional money is needed, Stevens said.

He further indicated that the city would not be able to hire one additional employe or meet the requests of Torrance residents for branch libraries, street signals, park improvements, or special services if the city had to hold the line at the present tax rate.

The City Council will have to decide soon whether or not taxes will be increased.


