Mayor Isen Tells Story Of City's Development

(Editor's note: Following is the test of Mayor Albert Isen's speech given before the judges in Memphis, Tennessee in November 1956. It gives a good description of Torrance's over-all development, and the reasons why Torrance, together with 10 other cities, was chosen an "All-America City" from among

164 cities in the nation.)

In October of 1910, an event occurred which shocked the nation . . . the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times Building . . . with great loss of life.


