Since speed is of the essence to obtain proper sites and keep costs to a minimum, Kroeger and Associates recommend immediate action. According to the report, bonds should be voted on in the early fall, and if successful, work starts at once, the project should be completed in two years.

The general recommendations made are:

1. A network of small four acres in area. to-ten acre park and play facilities for the 24 communityneighborhoods, totalling approximately 365 acres. This presupposes close cooperation between the city and school district so that additional fa- tennis courts and numerous

2. A system of three large areas with complete recreation facilities to serve each major section of the city totalling approximately any given period. 225 acres. Full cooperation with the high schools is assumed.

3. An expanded Civic Center to provide full facilities' for city-wide cultural and civic activities, totalling approximately 65 acres. A large regional auditorium, Little Theatre and arts building built in cooperation with Los Angeles county should be included and plans should be

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
