The City Council received a letter suggesting that the police and fire departments be consolidated and it was voted to look into the matter.

Robert W. Sable, Hollywood Riviera, in a letter to the council, suggested that considerable money could be saved in expenditures for equipment and salaries.

Councilman Nicholas Drale cast the only negative vote and went on record as definitely being opposed to such an investigation. The other members stated they did not necessarily favor such a merger but felt the idea was worth studying.

The letter was referred to study. After the situation has been reviewed, then the council will make its decision.

The city council is also going to investigate the waiver board without consent of the council. Mayor Albert Isen referred specifically to beer and whiskey billboards and certain "bootleg" signs apparently erected without city approval.




