Members of the Unaffiliated Group of PEO met recently at the home of Mrs. Ralph Meeker, at Palos Verdes Estates, for a desert luncheon.

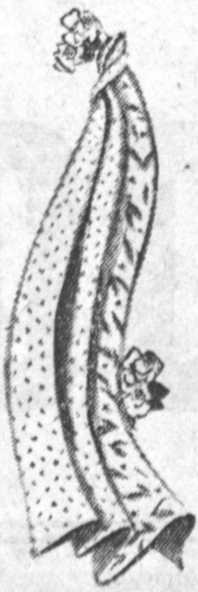

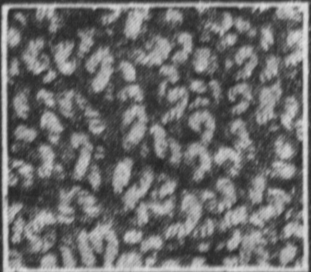
