college will be impossible with out approval of the tax rate. In following the unique, "payas-you-go" plan of financing, the college has developed the present modern campus, which is entirely debt-free. No interest charges to the taxpayer are accrued under the plan.

Five Districts Administered by a Board of Trustees representing the five high school districts included in the college district, El Camino is a community college in ad-

ministration as well as in function and intent. Representing the Inglewood area on the college board is Seymour Rayor, most recently elected member. The beach area of the district is represented by Foster A. Day of Redondo Beach, recently appointed

to fill the term of the late J.

R. Black, former board preside The Centinella Valley area is represented by Dr. Wallace Fraser, who serves as secretary of the administrative group, while Hilas C. Ashley is the vice-president of the board, representing the El Segundo area. Presently serving as president of the Board of Trustees is Jack N. Dabbs, who is up for reelection on the May 17 ballot in the Torrance area. He runs

unopposed. Closely related to the Board and its activities is Forrest G. Murdock, president of the college and superintendent of the college district. Considering the May 17 election, President Mur-dock stated, "the phenomenal development of the El Camino campus has misled people into believeing that the plant as i now stands is complete.

"With its facilties now utilized at full capacity, the campus is sufficient only for its current enrollment. Viewing the inevitable influx of students as reflected by enrollment figures of the past and present secondary school registration, we know that provision for an enrollment more than doubling that now attending El Camino must be made. We are appealing to the college community to give its support in the forthcoming election and are confident that the public will not allow the progress already made to be blighted by overcrowded and inadequate facilities."

College classes are conducted for all but six weeks of the year to accommodate local educational demands, the college day running from 7:30 a.m. until 10 p.m. daily.
