Monday evening the clouds began to gather and by 10:28 a light rain began falling. By 12:30 a.m. .08 of an inch had fallen in Torrance. The rain increased throughout the night and by morning a total of .19 of an inch had fallen.

Seeing as how it is May 23 the last few storms could be considered late and also unusual. although, two year ago we had .02 of an inch of rain in a freak June rain.
