District Fails

A motion by Councilman Robert Jahn to set up a street lighting assessment district in Torrance was defeated Tuesday night, 3-2, at the meeting of the City Council.

Jahn's reason for making the motion was that at the present time individuals living in areas without lights are paying for electricity used in areas having lights. He described this method "unfair," and said that the "city cannot assume the ever-increasing cost of lighting."

Councilman Victor Benstead argued that if property owners were assessed within a given district it would amount to a "hidden tax." Councilman Willys Blount and Nick Drale also opposed the motion.

According to the city manager's office, it is common practice among nearly all of the cities in the Los Angeles area to establish Street Lighting districts for operation and maintenance of street lighting systems.

In such districts the city normally pays for the lighting installations at intersections, and the remaining portion of the cost is assessed against property owners within the district. In this way, only those who receive the benefit of the lighting system pay for it, and those who are in areas which do not have lighting systems do not pay, except as their share of the General Fund cost of lighting intersections.

It has been the custom in Torrance to pay the entire cost of operating and maintaining street lights from the General Fund. However, the total cost has been steadily rising.

Additional cost for the past fiscal year has risen at the rate of \$1,000 a month, so states a report prepared in the office of the City Manager.

Even if the motion had been passed, it would be too late to establish assessment districts for the 1957-58 year. Districts would have to be established by August 10, 1958, in order to become effective November 1, 1958.

2 Douglas Men Fired For Accepting Favors

Two members of the purchasing department at Douglas Aircraft's Torrance plant have been discharged for accepting entertainment favors from an El Segundo subcontractor.

Information to this effect uncovered by the FBI was obtained in conjunction with Douglas co. invesigators, with the full cooperation of the entire Douglas organization, company spokesmen declared.

Included were trips to Las Vegas and Reno Nev., New York, and hunting and fishing trips to Mexico.

"To our knowledge no federal contracts were affected," the spokesman said.

The subcontractor reportedly supplied parts for Navy aircraft assembled at the Torrance plant.

The investigation began six months ago after the Internal Revenue Department questioned the tax returns of the subcontractor, it was reported.
