135-Acre Sports Center 'Pipe Dream' at Present

Talk of a 135-acre county sports center including the area bounded by Del Amo blvd., Henrietta, Torrance blvd., and the city limits is just talk at this stage. That was the general impression following a meeting of Torrance city officials, Torrance city councilmen, and Los Angeles officials Monday night.

The best that could be said was that if the park is to materialize, its realization is still a long ways off.

Talk of the park was first stirred up by a recreational survey conducted by Robert L. Gold of Louis J. Kroeger and

The survey suggested that the city "cooperate fully with the County Regional Planning and County Park and Recreation Departments in building a mafor regional sports center on the 135 to 170 acres.'

'Pipe Dream' Following the Monday night meeting, Mayor Albert Isen stated that the sports center at this time is "just a pipe dream."

"We can't count on this park in planning for our recreational needs," the mayor said. "Right now the issue is just in the discussion stage."

Mrs. Herma Tillim, Recreation Commission chairman, felt

"We can't say definitely that we're going to get it, but it still looks hopeful," she said.

\$1 Per Month Rubbish Fee Looks Certain

Starting October 1, no more incinerator burning will be permitted in Los Angeles county.

This means that the city must make plans for additional mass rubbish collection.

It has been estimated that the total cost of refuse collection will amount to about \$373,000.

In order to pay for this, city officials have indicated that a \$1 per month rubbish fee per residence will have to be charged.

Otherwise, the city will go in the red. Even with such a fee, the city budget will remain an "austerity budget" with no money left over except for the barest essentials.

If the city were to contract with a private collection agency, it could save about \$47,497.

However, we agree with the City Council that from a long-range point of view it is better that the city, rather than private operators, handle the refuse

What happened recently in Los Angeles serves as a good example.

As long as the city handles the refuse collection, it can keep the cost down to a minimum and exercise complete control in the interests of the

If it were handled by private operators, there would always be the danger that the citizens would be placed at the mercy of one collector who, by exercising virtual control here, could force residents to pay higher collection rates at will.

We believe that the \$1 collection fee which the city has in mind is reasonable and that municipal control over collections is desirable.

At present it looks as if the collection fee will be added to the water bill to minimize the bookkeeping

The mass exodus has been taking place within the last few weeks as three local pig farms are complying with a law requiring all hogs to leave the city by June 15.

At one time, the three farms had about 6000 hogs between them. As of Tuesday there were only about 600 left, according to George Powell, planning director.

George Green and Lester Kazarian had about 50 hogs each left, Tuesday, Powell said. These were to be shipped out today. Green's ranch is located at 190th st. and Beryl st. Kazarian's is located next to the Foley ranch at Madrona and Spencer, just north of the civic center.

The court hearing has been set for June 20. Powell said that Foley told him Tuesday that the pigs will be out before June 15 and that he has ordered trucks to haul the manure out starting June 17 in an effort to avoid court action.

rance.' The city began making things hot for hogs in 1953 when Foley's operation came under fire as a health menace.

Three years ago the council passed a law giving hog ranchers until this time to pack up and leave.

Since about a month ago, they have been getting rid of their hogs at the rate of about 300 a day, Powell said.

Los Angeles and Chicago residents favored the pay-TV idea. A spot-check in Torrance indicated a variety of opinions, of which the following five are typical:

BERNICE FLORENCE, police matron: "I don't see how pay-TV would improve television. It would still cost a lot of money to produce a program. It would give us movies free from commercials, but it would be cheaper to go to a show."

AL POSNER, school official: "I really haven't given the matter much thought. However, I haven't noticed too many musical programs at present. Whether pay-TV would change that I don't know."

DOROTHY FOLK, secretary: "I don't think I want to put 25 cents in every time unless I knew what the program was all about. But how many people read the advance reviews? I feel that I paid enough after paying for a TV set. Just put the commercials at the beginning and at the end, and I'll be

satisfied.' BERNICE GOODWIN, city hall employe: "I'm all for pay-TV. I'd rather pay and get something I want. This might give us more educational programs. The average person is far more intelligent than the average advertiser thinks. What makes me think so is the average program. Most people

I know are bored with TV." JEAN WREN, secretary: "I don't think I would like it. I don't really know how it would function. A combination set-up-commercial TV and pay-TV-would be best."
