Residents serviced by the Narbonne Ranch Water co. have reached the boiling point over low water pressure.

Petitions are now circulating asking the city of Torrance to take over water service to the area bounded by 239th st., Crenshaw, Sepulveda, and Eshelman.

Spokesman Frank Higgins, for the group, indicated that the water pressure has been down to 18 pounds for years now, when it should be between 30 to 60 pounds.


"The water supply is totally inadequate, even at the present time, to meet the ordinary demands of the consumers," the petition reads.

"Water pressure is so low," the petition continues, that it is impossible for the average household to obtain sufficient water to maintain lawns and shrubs without resorting to the installation and use of booster pumps at a cost of \$150 per consumer

"The water on many occasions is contaminated with dirt, oil and rust particles."

Angus McVicar, Torrance water superintendent, indicated that the city would have to lay all new pipe if it took over the district.

The nation's tallest furnace. which reaches higher than a 10story building, is now operating inside the Harvey Aluminum plant here.

One hundred and ten feet • high and seven feet in diameter, the vertical electric furnace was. designed and constructed by the Westinghouse Electric corp. to heat treat giant aluminumalloy shapes. The furnace provides controlled temperatures to multiply several times the strength of precision aluminum for aircraft, construction, and other uses.

Aluminum pieces up to 80 et long, squeezed through dies in extrusion presses with hydraulic forces powerful enough to lift a Navy cruiser, are succonded in the furnace and toughened for the required hours in temperatures up through 800 degrees Fahrenheit.

Then they are plunged instantly into 210,000 gallons of water in an underground quenching tank 110 feet deep and 18 feet in diameter. After a finishing process called "stretching," the Harvey aluminum is ready for shipment to customers.

The furnace is the largest size solution heat treatment furnace of its type built in the world. It is part of an order Harvey laced with Westinghouse to ouip its expanded manufacturing facilities. Westinghouse also supplied:

A smaller but expandable companion electric vertical furnace, 70 feet high, standing alongside the 110-foot furnace with a duplicate underground tank.


