

Recreation Theme 'Along Milky Way'

Activities are in full swing at the Torrance parks and playgrounds. Following is a schedule of activities at the parks for the week of July 15 through 19.

Theme for this week at the parks and playgrounds is "Along the Milky Way." Look for trips into outer space, flying saucers and spacemen.

TORRANCE PARK
On July 15 from 11-1 will be the story hour with Elsie Pestoff directing; from 2-4 tournaments are planned. The morning of July 16 is kept open for free play; circle games are scheduled from 1-2; crafts utilizing the space theme are in the offing from 3-4.

On July 17 there will be tour-

naments from 10-11; relays are scheduled from 4-5; Jim Davidson will be directing the instrumental music program from 1-4. Relay games are planned from 10-11 on July 18; from 12-1 there will be a box lunch; crafts centered around the space theme from 2-4. The special event for July 19 is an "out of space" party scheduled from 3-5.

EL RETIRO PARK
On July 15 from 10-12, a girls' softball practice is planned; from 1-3, crafts and baseball practice plus organized outdoor games from 3-5. The "tiny tot" program is scheduled from 10-12 on July 16; crafts are on the

agenda from 1-3.

On July 17 from 9:30-11 will be a girls' softball game; from 12-3 a hamburger and punch feed. Cost is 10 cents a serving. From 10-12 the "tiny tot" program is planned for July 18; at the same time a talent show utilizing the theme "stairway to the stars" will be held.

On July 19 the special event is a "flying saucer" disc throwing contest. Along with this will be other games, contests, etc.

SEA-AIRE PARK
On July 15 movies are planned for 10:45; from 1-5 Jim Davidson will be directing the instrumental music program. On July 16 crafts will be scheduled from 1-3. Low organization type games will be held on the morning of July 17; at 2 there will be a talent show.

On July 18 there will be crafts from 10-11; tournaments at 1:30. The special event for July 19 at 3 will be a baby contest. Babies must be under one year of

age and will be judged in various categories including darkest, curliest, most and least hair, most teeth, heaviest, and others.

WALTERIA PARK
On July 15, tournaments will be held in the morning; crafts from 1-3. On July 16 at 11 a Pee Wee League softball game is planned with Walteria park vs. El Retiro; at 10:45 movies will be shown.

At 9:30 on July 17, Elsie Pestoff, the "story lady" will present her story hour; crafts from 1-3; party games such as musical chairs, etc., will be played at 3:30. On July 18 a hobby show is planned for 1. At 12:30 on July 19 a cook-out is planned and following this will be an "outer space" program.

MCMASTER PARK
On July 15, at 2, there will be a "spacemen" costume contest. From 10-12 on July 16 the story hour will be held; at 12 there

will be a Midget League softball game; from 1-3 crafts utilizing the "Milky Way" theme and at the same time the instrumental music program; at 7 p.m. there will be a girls' softball game.

On July 17 from 10-12, crafts are scheduled; at 1 a Midget League softball game is planned; at 2 there will be a boys' track meet and will include such events as high jump, broad jump, 50 and 75 yard dash and circling the bases for time.

From 10-12 on July 18 tournaments are planned; at 2 a "trip to Mars" will be held which will include visiting the library and receiving information on the stars, planets, etc.; from 3-4 there will be square dancing; at 6:30, family night is planned.

On July 19 crafts will be held from 10-12; at 2 a bike derby is scheduled and will include such events as trick and precision riding and safety.

Bids for the men's athletic building and the warehouse and maintenance buildings will be opened on July 9, and the public hearing on the 1957-58 budget will be held in August, Arfwedson announced.
