VICE SQUAD RAIDS NORMA'S CAFE

Undercover Agents Nab Her In Act

Sheriff's vice squad officers last week raided Norma's cafe, 315 Border ave., arresting its owner, Miss Norma Haefell, 48, on suspicion of bookmaking.

The woman, who lives at 2313 Sierra st., was nabbed by undercover agents while placing a bet over the phone, according to police reports.

Officers observed and heard Miss Haefell taking bets over the phone, while one of the patrons was consulting the racing form.

When he told her how he wanted to bet she recorded the information, informing him that he owed her \$33, according to police.

Following this, another man placed a bet with her. When she went to the telephone to place the call, the undercover agents identified themselves and placed her under arrest.

Also arrested at this time was Francis Ferganchick, 45, 2611 W. Redondo Beach Blvd., Gardena, who was seen removing betting markers from his pocket and throwing them on the floor, according to officers. He was released, however, because of insufficient evidence on the DA's recommendation.

Miss Haefell admitted taking bets, stating that she received 10 per cent of all lost bets. Ferganchick refused to make any statements.

35-Cent Override Tax Seen

The local school district will probably ask 35 cents of the 75-cent override tax approved by local voters last year, Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, stated last week.

The 35-cent tax increase represents a much smaller part of the 75-cent override tax than first anticipated.

At one point, when there was uncertainty about increased State aid to local schools, it was believed that the whole 75-cent override tax might be necessary.

After increased State aid was signed into law, officials were talking in terms of a possible 50-cent override tax.

Hull said that this year's \$8,280,264 school budget is as tight as possible.

The tax rate would amount to \$1.65 general tax; 35-cent override; 13-cent employee retirement; 80-cent bond retirement; 56-cent El Camino college tax, totaling \$3.49 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Police Smash Dope Cells in \$5000 Raid



Thousands of residents from all over the Torrance area are expected to attend the four-day Torrance fiesta, said to be the most colorful ever staged.


Dubbed officially "Ranchero Days," the fiesta got under way last night and will continue through and including Sunday, July 28.

Included in the military exhibits will be the B-50 bomber, "Lucky Lady II," the first plane to fly non-stop around the world; the 48-foot replica of an Essex class aircraft carrier; and, tonight only, a Nike and tank exhibit.

Columbia-Geneva Steel Back on 'Normal' Schedule, 60 Employees Laid Off

After 18 months of operating 15 turns a week to meet a heightened demand for structural steel shapes, the 36,22-inch rolling mill will be returned Monday to a normal 10-turn operating rate at the Torrance Works of

US Steel's Columbia-Geneva Steel division, it was announced today by Don Lasell, general superintendent.

Necessitated by a reduced demand for light structural shapes the return to normal operating rate will result in a reduction of about 60 members of the Torrance Works' total working force of 987.

The operation of the open hearth and other departments at Torrance Works will not be affected, and will continue at their present high level of production, Lasell said.

Rolling mill employees affected by the reduced schedule will be transferred to other departments according to their seniority.

About half of those being terminated are temporary employees hired last month for vacation relief purposes only, Lasell declared. All employees scheduled to be laid off have (Turn to Page 28)

Must We Wait Until Somebody Is Killed?

It was only a few weeks ago that the community was shocked by the traffic slaughter in which four young girls and one adult were killed.

The accident occurred on one of the major traffic arteries in the area, Vermont ave., which is poorly regulated for the traffic it bears.

Another such artery is Western ave. from 174th st. to Pacific Coast hwy. It is only a matter of time before it, too, will be the scene of a similar nightmare.

It is impossible, for instance, to make left-hand turns at certain intersections for lack of three-way signals.

Furthermore, the absence of divider strips and turn-off lanes make Western ave. a menace and potential death trap.

With the heavy traffic pouring out of local industries using Western ave. as a major connecting link, definite action should be taken now to make Western ave. a safe, sane, and efficient highway.

We urge the Torrance City Council and the Los Angeles City Council to take action according to their jurisdiction.

Torrance rates fifth in population in Los Angeles county, according to the July survey of the Los Angeles County Regional Planning Commission.

Population estimates place Torrance at 90,101, a jump of 9000 since the last special census in October, 1956, when the figure was slightly above 82,000.

Howard Smith Involved in Grim Comedy of Errors...

A news broadcaster who apparently forgot how common a name "Smith" is caused no end of confusion in Torrance Saturday morning.

Subject of the grim comedy of errors was Howard Smith, Torrance High school graduate, and son of Mr. and Mrs. George B. Smith, of 22516 Warmside.

A radio news broadcast Saturday morning mentioned only that a "Howard Smith of Torrance" was killed in an accident, without fuller details.

Shocked friends of the local youth contacted the Torrance Press to check on the truth of the report.

After trying a number of indirect means to confirm the report, the Torrance Press reporter called the Smith family directly.

Demonstrating concretely that the story of his death was greatly exaggerated was Howard Smith himself, who answered the phone.

Furthermore, it was the first he'd heard about it and the (Turn to Page 28)
