## North American Lay-offs **Charged to General Motors**

A charge that General Motors executives holding ey positions inside the United states government may have exerted undue in-

cancellation of the 17,000-job | Navajo missile contract at North American Aircraft was made Saturday by Alan Cranston, president of the Califluence in the controversial fornia Democratic Council.

"A careful investigation should be made by Congress to establish whether any General Motors officials serving within the government manipulated the killing of the

Navajo project," Cranston declared. "We are entitled to know if the simultaneous granting of special privileges to a General Motors subsidiary in Wisconsin for a similar missile program is mere coincidence.

Cranston declared there is an "uncounted squadron of GM officials" in the government. "The squadron is led," he said, "by former GM President Charles Wilson, now Secretary of Defense, who is only one of three GM executives to serve in cabinet posts under President Eisenhower." 31 Per Cent Profit

The Democratic leader, a Palo Alto business man, said that General Motors now makes two per cent of all annual sales in the United States, grosses 12 billion dollars a year, and in 1955 netted a profit of 31 per cent after taxes. "Congress should determine whether actions of the United States government have been the key factor in this unparalleled success for a single company," he said.

Cranston spoke at a dinner meeting sponsored by the Seventeenth Congressional District Democratic Council held at the Torrance Civic auditorium.

The CDC president declared the Navajo cancellation is only the latest of "countless government acts favoring American's supergiant corporations at the expense of their smaller competitors." He charged that one per cent of American corporations now control 50 per cent of American corporate wealth and employ half of America's 64,000,-000 workers.

"All manufacturing and most distributing and service business will be in the hands of corporations worth more than \$100,000,000 within 18 years if the present rate of big business growth and small business shrinkage is not halted," he said.

Smaller Business Failing Cranston stated that small businesses are failing at the rate of 250 firms a month. Business deaths in 1957 will be greater than in any year since 1939," he said. "We must move heaven and earth to preserve the America where any citizen can start a business with some hope of suc-Cess.

"It was the size of the biggest corporations that led to

their nationalization in England, and it was the size of the greatest cartels that led to their Nazification in Germany," Cranston warned. "Let us be on guard against a trend in our own country that might lead to the end of free entreprise. Let us remember that Lenin, first dic-

tator of the Soviet Union, once declared that the strength of capitalism lies in the strength of small business." Cranston demanded rethe car. examination of "the many government policies helping

big business and hurting small business." Among these policies he listed tight money, taxation, and the placing of "virtually all government contracts with the greatest corporations."

The CDC president charged there is mounting evidence


