Self Expression, Creativity Taught Through Modern Dance

SECOND SESSION UNDERWAY

Since earliest recorded history, dancing has been a means of communication and a form of art.

Through the dance people can express hate, love, fear and devotion. And through the ages people have told stories and performed rituals in the dance.

Torrance youngsters have the opportunity to learn to express themselves by this means in a class offered by the Torrance recreation department.

Some people call it modern dancing and some call it interpretive dancing but it is above all a form of expression.

The second session of the modern dance program has begun. Classes are held for beginners aged 7 to 13 from 9 to 9:45 a.m. Beginners aged 14 to 18 from 10 to 10:45 a.m. and advanced students, aged 7 to 18, from 11 to 11:45 a.m.

Classes will be held daily, Monday through Friday and continue through August 23, at the civic auditorium, Cravens and El Prado.

Mickey Van Deventer, the instructor, has had considerable experience in this field. She participated in classes and performances for four years at the University of Redlands.

The class begins with warm-up exercises and various techniques.

The program is designed to help the participants become trim, graceful and most of all, creative.

"So many young people today have their creative abilities lying dormant because they depend on someone else for entertainment," she said.

Here is a chance for young people to learn to use their imaginations through the medium of dance. A healthy body and creative mind can be the products of a class such as this.

Dance numbers were presented at the annual Torrance equacade and two more shows are scheduled for the summer.

The first will take place in the Torrance park bandshell on August 11.

The final presentation this summer will be seen at the open house at the civic auditorium on August 23.

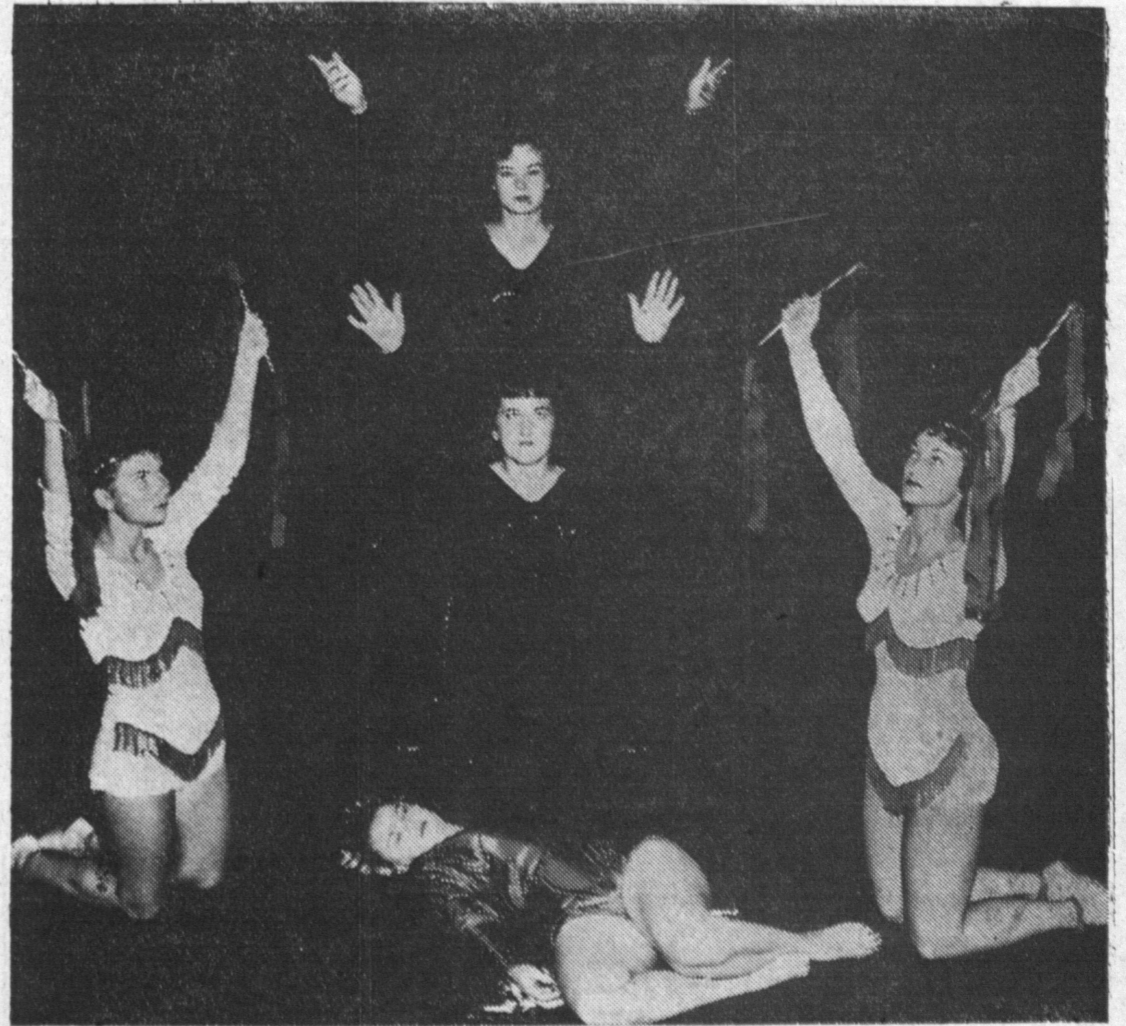
Rehearsals for these shows will be held in the afternoons at the civic auditorium following the regular classes.

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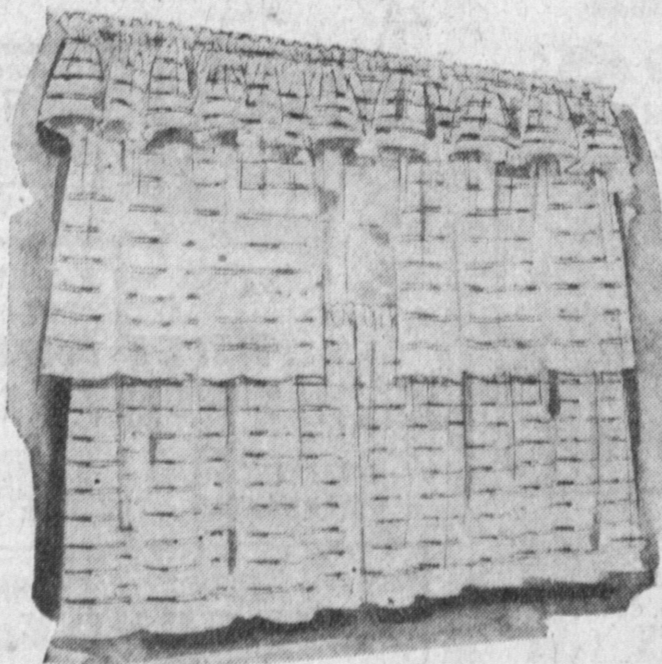


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
