

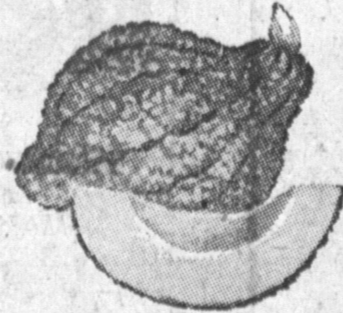

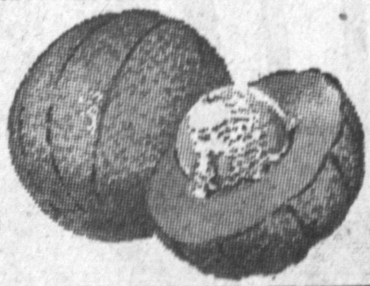

Torrance Teachers Get Ready

The 830 teachers who will teach in Torrance schools this year will report for duty several days prior to the opening of school.

During this preparatory period they will attend workshops and meetings, organize their instructional materials, get acquainted with teaching aid furnished by the district, and prepare their classrooms.

This year Torrance will have 175 new teachers. This group reports on September 5 and 6 for meetings which will acquaint them with the educational program and policies which are unique to the Torrance Schools.

Superintendent J. H. Hull will greet the new teachers at the

Parkway School on September 5, at 11 a.m.

Schedules are set for tours of the District Library. The Torrance Education association will welcome the new teachers at a tea to be held at the Torrance Y.W.C.A. the afternoon of September 6 from 3 to 4:30 p.m.

On September 9, 10, and 11 all teachers of the district will report at their assigned buildings for a series of preparatory sessions. The second day, September 10, opens with a district meeting for all teachers.

This is to start at 8:30 a.m. and will be held at the Torrance High Auditorium. Superintendent J. H. Hull will address the group. The subject of his presentation will be "Reporting."

Meetings and work periods at the buildings will be confined to such areas as the Torrance reporting plan, improvement of arithmetic instruction, plans for the first day of school, classroom organization, and provisions for adapting instruction to the individual differences of children.
