Series of Meetings Scheduled

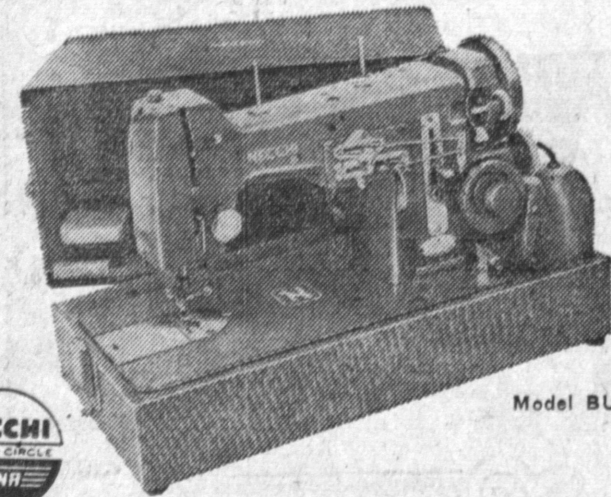
Rev. Harold Walker of Auburn, Indiana, will be the special speaker at a series of meetings beginning August 28 at the Lomita Missionary church.

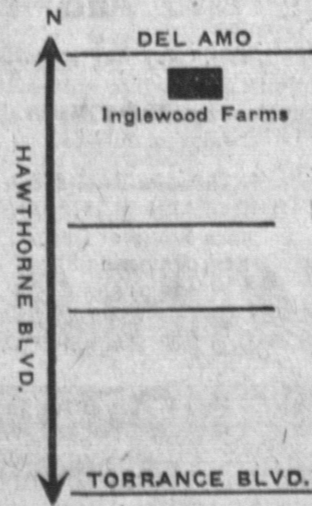
