

Names of Five New EC Instructors Announced

Of the 25 new instructors to join the El Camino college staff this fall, five will teach in the division of natural sciences, physical education and athletics under the director of John W. Morrow.

The five are Mrs. Doris E. Downey, Miss Joan A. Wooton, A. B. Cockrum, Hugh L. Rood, and Kenneth Dane Swearingen. Mr. Downey, a native of Los Angeles, will join the women's physical education department. Married, Mrs. Downey comes to El Camino from Mira Costa High school. She has also taught in the South Bay Adult school and at the University of Southern California.

Mrs. Downey completed work for her bachelor of science degree at USC and is within one unit of attaining her master of science degree in physical education at the same institution. Also joining the women's P. E. staff is Miss Wooton, a native of Santa Barbara, whose work was completed at the University of California at Santa Barbara, where she obtained her BA in physical education, and at USC, where she was awarded the master of science degree in education.

Active in the school camping program of the Bellflower schools for one year, Miss Wooton comes to El Camino from Torrance High school, where she taught for the past three years. She was also a member of the staff of the Torrance Recreation department.

A teacher of biology and zoology, Rood is a native of Sacramento, now residing in Torrance. He has been active in youth work, in private business with his father, and, for the past two years, taught at Downey Senior High school. Mr. and Mrs. Rood are the parents of three children.

The new science instructor completed work at El Camino college, USC, and Long Beach State college, where he was awarded the BA and MA degrees in biological science.

Geology is the subject field of Cockrum, a Gardena resident who was born in Queen City, Mo. Cockrum's work was completed at Pan American College, in Edinburg, Texas, where he received his associate of arts degree, at USC, North Texas State, and the University of Texas, where he received both the bachelor of science and master of arts degrees in geology.

In addition to serving as a production geologist and an exploration geologist in the petroleum field, the new instructor has had teaching experience at the University of Texas, Adams Junior High School and Dorsey High School in Los Angeles, Morningside High School in Inglewood, and at East Los Angeles Junior College.

Newest member of the El Camino college coaching staff will be Kenneth D. Swearingen, a graduate of Redondo Beach Union High School and a former El Camino student. The Ohio native received his bachelor of arts degree from the College of Pacific in Stockton, where he is also completing work for his master's degree.

At COP, Swearingen served for a year as freshman backfield coach and as assistant baseball coach. In addition to his coaching duties at the local campus, he will teach in the physical education department.

EC to Offer Skin Diving Instruction

The final weeks of the El Camino college summer swimming program will begin Monday, August 26, with a special program for Red Cross, Boy and Girl Scouts, divers and swimmers, according to Merl F. Sloan, Director of Student of Student Personnel. Invitations have been issued to all scout groups and others who wish to qualify for first class and merit badges for swimming and Red Cross certificates, the college official stated.

The hours for testing have been set for 8 to 9, 10 to 11 a.m. and 3 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Special classes in skin diving and platform diving will be held from 2 to 3 p.m. daily, the director indicated.

Family hours have been scheduled for the week from 9 to 10 a.m. and 7 to 8 p.m. All adults are invited as are children under 18 who are accompanied by one or both parents in the pool. Other recreational swimming hours are: 11-12 a.m., 1-2 and 4-5 p.m. (minimum age, 7 years) and 6-7, 8-9 and 9-10 p.m. (18 yrs. of age or older).

EC College Enrollment Schedule Told

"All students wishing to enroll for fall courses at El Camino college may now secure appointments for registration," Leo M. Christian, assistant director of student personnel, announced today.

Full time students may currently secure counseling and registration appointments in the counseling office, Christian indicated. He defined a full-time student as one planning enrollment in 10 or more units.

These students, all of whom must have counseling appointments prior to their registration, may enroll until September 6. Appointments for counseling and registration will be made until that date, although college officials advise the earliest possible date of enrollment.

Part time day or evening students, planning programs of 9 1/2 units or less, may secure permits for registration in the registration office until August 30. Actual registration of these part time students who have received permits to register will be conducted from August 21 to August 30, the college representative noted.

Registration for part time students without permits will be conducted from 5:30 until 7:30 p.m. September 3, 4, and 5, and from 1 to 2 p.m. September 6, Christian stated. He emphasized that early registration insures the best possible programming.

DON'T BE A STATISTIC!

Most fatal traffic accidents in California involve only one vehicle . . . so don't blame the other fellow, J. T. Blalock, president, Greater Los Angeles Safety Council, said today as he urged motorists to drive with caution over the Labor Day week-end.

Blalock said that in California last year, 56 per cent of the fatal traffic accidents involved only one driver.

"The driver," he said, "either struck a pedestrian, went off the roadway, or ran into a fixed object. It's high time, he said, "that motorists quit blaming the other fellow and start examining their own driving habits."

Blalock said that nationally, traffic accidents are running slightly below the 1956 rate. Fa-

talities for the Memorial Day and Fourth of July holidays fell below the estimates, proving, he said, that holidays don't have to be "horror days."

Advising motorists to stay home, the Safety Council president said, is not the answer to the holiday accident problem. Americans can enjoy the highways on a holiday, he said, simply by practicing courtesy and common sense.

Records show that the majority of holiday accidents occur during the first 30 hours of a three-day week-end. This, Blalock said, indicates that travelers are trying to cover too much ground in too short a period.

For the coming Labor Day, he recommended that motorists plan trips in easy stages.
