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### Have fun in the sun... SAFELY!

Those long stretches of sand along our coast are wonderful summer playgrounds. They provide the whole family with a grand place for healthful exercise and recreation in the sun. 6. Avoid roughhousing, and games that might annoy or injure others.
7. Remember that the sun can cause serious burns. Don't overexpose yourself, or allow your children to do so.
8. Get prompt attention for cuts caused by broken glass or shells, to prevent infection.
9. Obey posted beach regulations and guards' warnings.
10. Don't be a show-off—it may be your last performance.
