

## Drivers Advised of Latest State Laws

A record number of Vehicle Code amendments will go into effect next Wednesday, September 11, the Automobile Club of Southern California reminds motorists.

To discuss the most significant of the 236 amendments which were signed into law during the past legislative session, the club's legal staff met with more than 100 Southern California judges, prosecuting attorneys and enforcement officers last night.

**Significant Amendments**  
A club spokesman said the changes considered most important in their effect upon motorists are as follows:

1. Revision of the left-turn rule, which places a greater responsibility on the person turning left to yield the right-of-way to oncoming traffic. The left-turner must yield to any vehicle which constitutes a hazard at any time during the turning movement.

2. Increasing the distance at which turning signals must be given to 100 feet; the former requirement was 50 feet.

3. Changing the prima facie speed limit in school zones to 25 mph; formerly it was 15 mph.

4. Stiffening of drunk driving laws. When no injury results, the minimum fine is \$250, and for a second offense, both five days in jail and a \$250 fine. When injury results, the minimum penalty is both 90 days in jail and a \$250 fine.

5. Prohibiting the hanging of mirrors or other objects on rear-view mirrors or elsewhere if they impair the driver's vision through the windshield.

**Run-Away Cars Covered**

The club also advised motorists that new amendments make it mandatory for the person who parked a vehicle which becomes a run-away vehicle and damages property, or an un-

attended vehicle, to fulfill all legal requirements as though he were driving at the time of the accident, otherwise he is subject to penalties for hit-and-run.

**License Renewal**

Driver's license renewal procedures have been changed. Starting September 11 drivers applying for a renewal who have been convicted of two or more moving traffic violations within the two years preceding application for renewal will be eligible for only a two-year license. A better driving record will make him eligible for a five-year license.

Under the new law the license expiration date will be the same as the driver's birth date, a measure intended to help motorists remember when to renew their license, the club said. Motorists will be permitted to apply for renewal within six months before the expiration date. Failure to renew within 30 days after expiration of a license will limit the license to three years.

## Adults May Take Tests to Get High School Diplomas

cerning the GED tests or registration, telephone the Adult Education Office, FA 8-2272, located at Torrance High school 2220 W. Carson street.

The test formerly applied only to veterans who received high school diplomas upon completing courses in U.S. History and U. S. Government.

Non-veterans will now have an opportunity to earn a maximum of 100 credits toward their high school diplomas by successfully passing a series of tests. In addition to the GED tests, non-veterans must complete, or have completed, at least one year of English and Mathematics and courses in U. S. History and U. S. Government.

The series of tests date back to World War II when educators sought to meet the needs of servicemen whose high school education had been interrupted. The GED battery of tests were developed to appraise the educational development of adults in the areas of English grammar, science, social studies, literature and mathematics. To be eligible to take the GED tests individuals must be enrolled in the Torrance Evening High school. Classes start September 16. The Adult Education Office will be open the first two weeks in September from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for new students who desire to register for high school credit. For further information con-

state-collected taxes are returned to all California cities each year on a per capita basis; and pending the next Federal Census, the State will officially establish Lomita's population by multiplying by three the number of registered voters on the date incorporation is confirmed."

**13,986 Population Credit**  
Not counting any recent registrations, Lomita had 4662 qualified voters last month, according to the County Registrar of Voters. This would give the new municipality a minimum population credit of 13,986 people and each one of them will be worth \$8.54 a year for the next three and a half years in non-property tax revenues to the city government according to Chandler who emphasized that this one source of income adds up to \$119,999 annually.

In discussing future campaign plans, Chairman Chandler said it had always been the hope and intent of his committee to resolve the question of incorporation on the basis of factual information and by friendly discussion among fellow-citizens, "but now it appears that there are certain powerful outside interests who don't want the people to decide the issue for themselves on its merit."

**Opponents Will Stop at Nothing**  
"Desperately fearful that their filthily-hidden objectives can't be attained under home rule, these professional opponents of self-government are apparently prepared to stop at nothing to defeat incorporation wherever and whenever it is proposed," Chandler declared.

"Their methods follow a consistent pattern of divide and conquer," he continued. "Using under-cover tactics to mastermind the efforts of unsuspecting and misguided local citizens, they employ a vicious type of smear and fear campaign, climaxed by last-minute name-calling and fabricated propaganda."

**Consider Source**  
Declaring that recently-circulated anti-incorporation literature bore all of the earmarks of such authorship, Chandler warned Lomita residents not to be misled but to consider the source and verify the authenticity of any information they receive about incorporation.

"Honestly expressed differences of opinion are one thing, but outright falsehoods are something else entirely," he concluded.

pitals, Diagnostic and Referral services, Mental Health Education, Out-Patient Clinics and Rehabilitation services.

Dr. McMillen stated that although many surveys have been conducted on mental health, perhaps this is the first survey of this particular kind which will rely heavily on persons in the community to gather the factual data and plan jointly to meet their mental health needs.

This survey was made possible by a grant from the State Department of Mental Hygiene and the Welfare Planning council of the Los Angeles Region. It will require 18 months to complete.
