A rock thrown through the front door window enabled the burglar or burglars to reach ound and open the door. Mrs. Brown estimated that the clothing was taken between 11 p.m. on Monday and 5:45 a.m. on Tuesday.

The store, fronting on Cren-shaw, just off Torrance blvd., was lighted all night.


