

AUTOMATION AT NORTHROP—A giant 54-ton milling machine capable of manufacturing high precision parts in one continuous operation which formerly required many set-ups and costly templates, has been installed by Northrop Aircraft, Inc., at its Northrop Division plant in Hawthorne. It is the first such machine to be put into operation on the West Coast. The massive, \$350,000 machine, manufactured by the Kearney and Trecker Co., Milwaukee, operates a number of intricate cutting and milling techniques from a thin, one-inch wide plastic roll of tape. The taps is fed into a projector-like mechanism which transmits data to electronic devices controlling the operation of the machine. The tool is known as a "numericallycontrolled" profile milling machine and is a part of the Air Force and Northrop long range plan to obtain advanced weapons systems economically.
