

# YMCA PLANS BUSY SCHEDULE FOR BOYS

The Torrance YMCA announced today that registrations are being accepted for the second five week series of Saturday fun for all boys from eight to twelve years of age.

The popular program, known as the YMCA Adventure club, provides a wide variety of recreation on most Saturdays during the school year.

The next session begins Saturday, November 16, with a trip to Jungland in Thousand Oaks. There the boys will see many circus acts, as well as a circus animal zoo. They will eat a picnic lunch in the oak groves at Tapia Park to make the day complete.
