Police issued the following description of John Lawrence Miller, 15, of Long Beach:





Now in use at the Torrance Works of U. S. Steel's Columbia-Geneva Steel Division, a new seif locking gate for heavy-duty crane hooks is the latest in several score methods improvements developed by Thomas Ramskill, open hearth maintenance foreman. during his 31 years at the mill. Of a total of 58 methods improvements submitted in the

last five years alone, for example, all but eight of his ideas were accepted by plant management, giving Tommy Ramskill a batting average that would rate high in any league.

A few of his methods improvements that were adopted

include a snap-on coupling for | West 220 st. with his wife, open hearth door frames, a redesign of open hearth burners and a redesigned hydraulic drive for the open hearth charging machine.
