

Candidate for Governor Finds Golf Relaxing, Too

After announcing his candidacy for Governor last week, Attorney-General Edmund G. (Pat) Brown indulged in what he joked about as his "only Republican vice"—a round of golf. His opponent was Mrs. Brown. He took the time off from his demanding public job because it was their twenty-seventh wedding anniversary. He believes that if he plays enough he may some day defeat Mrs. Brown. She shoots in the low 80's. The Attorney-General's scores are almost as much of a state secret as Pres-

ident Eisenhower's. But, a friend remarked, "he'll be happy the day he breaks one hundred."

The Attorney-General wonders sometimes if his interest in the game has ideological roots. Twenty-nine years ago, when he first ran for office—an unsuccessful bid for a state assembly seat—it was as a Republican. Four years later, in 1934, he became a Democrat, and has remained one through assorted vicissitudes.

BIG BUSINESS

At any rate, golf is about his only recreation. Most of the time he is preoccupied with managing what has been described as one of the biggest law businesses in the country. His staff includes 110 lawyers and some 600 other personnel.

His office annually handles several thousand civil cases, upwards of a thousand criminal cases, and nearly a thousand proceedings before boards and commissions.

Brown, 52 years old, handles his many responsibilities with what is called an amiable aplomb. He still has found time to take many progressive steps, including investigation of a scandal-ridden State Liquor Administration, an array of special studies of the narcotics and juvenile problems, and a running cam-

aign to establish conclusive law enforcement statistical systems.

As a political figure, he is known as a steady rather than spectacular individual. Stocky, bespectacled and neat, he looks like a Madison Avenue typification of your friendly neighborhood druggist, grocer or optician. He is a forceful speaker but without hint of demagoguery.

STUDIED AT NIGHT

He went directly from high school to night school study of law while simultaneously taking courses at the University of California's San Francisco Extension Division. Brown was elected twice as District Attorney of San Francisco, and twice for the Attorney Generalship. The last time he won the nominations of both parties, the only statewide voter to do so, and his final vote far exceeded that of any officeholder in the last six years.

The Browns live in San Francisco. They have two married daughters, a third 12 years old, and a son Edmund G. Jr. Mrs. Brown, daughter of a San Francisco police captain, and Pat were childhood sweethearts at Lowell high.

After taking a look at her husband's schedule for the next few months, Mrs. Brown is quite certain she will remain golf champion of the family, because, as she added, "Pat won't be playing much golf in 1958!"

Factory Jobs Drop 35,600

Factory employment in California dropped by 35,600 from September to a total of 1,255,200 wage and salary workers in October, Ernest B. Webb, California Director of Industrial Relations, announced Friday. This loss was the largest for any month since November 1953, Webb pointed out, and was greater than any September-October since 1945, immediately following the end of World War II.

About one-third of the decline resulted from layoffs in aircraft and associated industries. The remaining two-thirds reflected seasonal cutbacks, principally in food processing and lumber.

Aircraft employment was down by 6,500 from September. The October total of 261,400 aircraft workers' was about 24,000 less than the postwar peak established in April and 7,500 less than a year ago.

Significant declines were recorded in October in a number of heavy-goods industries in addition to aircraft, including electrical equipment, machinery, scientific instruments, and ordnance.

Employment gains from September of over 1000 each were recorded in automobiles and apparel manufacturing.

There were nearly 15,000 fewer workers with factory jobs in October 1957 than a year ago. This was the first time in three years that factory employment was under the same month of the previous year.

More than 600 of the nation's top business executives, representing more than 500 electrical manufacturing companies are attending this annual conference of one of the largest major trade associations in the country.

Fraser, a member of the Board of Governors of NEMA and of the Wire and Cable Section's Advisory Committee, was also honored earlier this year by a testimonial dinner in New York City marking his retirement after a two-year term as Chairman of the Wire and Cable Section of NEMA.
