

'Life of Sam Johnson' to Be Shown

James Boswell's "Life of Samuel Johnson" starring Peter Ustinov and Kenneth Haigh, will be dramatized on "Omni-bus," Sunday, December 15 at 4 p.m.

Ustinov, British actor, author, composer and playwright, will make his American TV acting debut when he portrays the celebrated and irascible Dr. Johnson. Ustinov currently is starring on Broadway in his comedy, "Romanoff and Juliet." Haigh, who will play Boswell, is the star of the Broadway play "Look Backin' Anger." His characterization of Jimmy Porter in the play has won him wide critical acclaim.

The television play will embrace the entire 21-year period of Boswell's close friendship with Johnson — from 1763 to 1784, the year in which the great lexicographer died.

Murrow Visits Gov. Meyner

New Jersey's recently re-elected Governor Robert B. Meyner and his wife will be visited by Edward R. Murrow "Person to Person," Friday, December 13 at 9:30 p.m.

Meyner was elected Governor of New Jersey in 1953 and in November won re-election to a second term with a record vote that even exceeded his overwhelming '53 victory. As a result he is now regarded as a strong candidate for the Presidential nomination in 1960.

The Governor and his wife Helen live in Princeton, N. J. in one of the oldest and most historic homes in the East. Built by Richard Stockton, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, in 1701, the house has played host to George Washington and has entertained 18 U.S. Presidents.

To Survey Scientific Race Between U. S. and Russia

Live television will move out to sea with an atomic submarine for the first time, Sunday, December 8 when "Wide World" surveys the scientific race between the United States and the Soviet Union.

The program will introduce Luis Alvarez, Glenn T. Seaborg, Ernest Lawrence and other leading American scientists and will look in at centers of education and research both in this country and in Russia.

"We won't try to teach a science lesson," says John Goetz, who will produce the program. "We want to look at science as a whole and find out where we are lagging behind the Soviets and why."

The program is titled "The Endless Frontier" and will be presented on "Wide World" at 4 p.m. Narrator Dave Garroway will guide viewers: To the atomic submarine Sea Wolf townsway a dive at sea and to meet the captain and crew. Also aboard will be the captain of the atomic-powered Nautilus, which recently returned from a cruise beneath the Arctic ice cap.

To the University of California to see the university's bevy of scientists and to talk with scientists, who will compare American and Russian progress in science and education. The segment will include special films from Russia.

To schools across America to survey student attitudes toward science and learn what happens to the enthusiasm and curiosity with which children in their early years regard the natural world around them.

To the Smithsonian Institution in Washington to meet its director, Dr. Leonard Carmichael, and to find out about the process of scientific discovery and to learn whether it is true that America has contributed more to technology than to basic research.

To the Argonne National Laboratories in Illinois to see such experiments as the nuclear irradiation of foods. Viewers will meet students from Pakistan, Iran, Chile, and the Philippines who will discuss what atomic power can do for their countries.

To the Bronx High School of Science in New York City to look in on meetings of the students' science clubs. The program will attempt to find out how this school has imparted a sense of adventure to the study of science.

Nutcracker Ballet on TV December 22

"The Nutcracker," the celebrated Christmas ballet, with music by Tchaikovsky, will be presented "live" from New York as a special holiday program on CBS Television's "The Seven Lively Arts," December 22.

George Balanchine, one of the world's foremost choreographers, will stage "The Nutcracker" especially for "The Seven Lively Arts," marking the first time that any ballet classic has been completely re-choreographed for the camera techniques of television.

The fairy tale will be danced by a cast of approximately 95, including 55 regular members of the New York City Ballet and 40 children. Heading the company are the celebrated Maria Tallchief, who will be seen as the sugar-plum fairy; and Andre Eglevsky, as her cavalier.

Other distinguished artists who will be seen in this special production of "The Nutcracker" include Diana Adams, Patricia Wilde, Melissa Hayden, Yvonne Mounsey, Allegra Kent, Nicholas Magallanes, Jacques D'Amboise, Barbara Walczak, Barbara Fallis, Barbara Milberg, Robert Barnett and Jonathan Watts.

"The Nutcracker" tells the story of Christmas Eve in a home where one of the toys, a nutcracker shaped like a soldier, comes to life as a handsome prince and takes the little girl of the house through a fairytale of wondrous adventures. Viewers will see the delightful "Waltz of the Flowers"; the Spanish, Arabian, Chinese and Russian dances; the dance of the sugar-plum fairy; and the dazzling waltz of the snowflakes, among the many musical numbers.

Maurice Evans Stars in TV's 'Twelfth Night'

Shakespeare's frolic of confused identities and star-crossed lovers, "Twelfth Night," starring Maurice Evans as Malvolio, will be colorcast on the "Hallmark Hall of Fame," Sunday, December 15 at 6:30 p.m.

When Evans appeared in the same role opposite Helen Hayes as Viola, in 1940, the late critic Burns Mantle wrote that he "lifted the classic to a new level." The distinguished actor's previous appearances on "Hallmark Hall of Fame" have been in "Hamlet," "Richard II," "Macbeth," "The Devil's Disciple," "The Taming of the Shrew" and "Man and Superman," all to critical acclaim.

Mark Twain Tale On TV Show

NBC Matinee Theater's first presentation of a story by Samuel Clemens, better known as Mark Twain, has been scheduled for Wednesday, December 4, to highlight a week of "live" colorcast on the daytime series at 12 p.m.

Chosen from the voluminous works of the famed 19th century humorist is "The Man That Corrupted Hadleyburg," a whimsical study of righteousness in a small town.

It is a story of small town folk whose righteousness is put to the test by the mysterious arrival of a burlap sack and its amazing contents.

Report on Middle East Will Be Made on TV Show

"Middle East Smoke Screen," a penetrating study of the current situation in the Middle East where the Soviet Union has pushed Syria to the brink of a shooting war with neighboring Turkey, will be the subject of a special half-hour CBS news program on "The Twentieth Century" series, Sunday, December 8, at 6:30 p.m. on the CBS Television Network.

The program will reveal how Russia, by the usual means of Communist infiltration, has surreptitiously fanned the fires of Arab Nationalism in the Middle East, in her effort to extend the sphere of Soviet influence in this part of the world.

The special news program on Dec. 8 will feature exclusive on-the-spot film reports from Syria, Turkey and other Middle East areas involved in the present crisis. Filming of the program is still in progress and will continue until the last possible day, in order to present the latest developments from the world's current "powder keg."

CBS News has assigned three correspondent-camera teams which are now working on the story. The program will feature an interview by correspondent Kearns with Syria's so-called "strong man," Gen. Bizri, and interviews with other key figures in the developing story.

CBS News correspondent Howard K. Smith, who will "anchor" the special program "live" in a studio in New York, will furnish background material, give an up-to-the-minute report on the Syrian-Turkish problem and provide an analysis of its widespread ramifications.
