

Commemorate Anniversary Of John Greenleaf Whittier

Poet John Greenleaf Whittier, for whom the town of Whittier is named, will be honored Sunday, December 15, at 11 a.m. when KTTV (Channel 11) telecasts the special services of the Quaker First Friends Church in Whittier. The Reverend Harold Walker will deliver the sermon titled "The Faith of John Greenleaf Whittier."

One of the Quaker poet's poems has been set to music by Dr. Halsey Stevens of the USC Music Department, and the hymn will be part of the services observing the 150th anniversary of Whittier's birth. The youth choir of the church will also take part in the morning commemoration.

Behind-the-scenes narrator of the series is Dr. Clifton

Moore, director of radio and television for the Los Angeles Presbytery.

In addition to the morning church services which will be telecast by Channel 11, the town of Whittier is holding an afternoon celebration at Whittier College. Whittier's Mayor A. C. Newsom and Whittier College President Paul Smith will take part in the program during which the Drama Department of the college will present selections from Whittier's poetry and dramatized highlights of the poet's life.

'High Adventure' Ranges Into Arctic Ice Fields

Across the Bering Sea, fifty-three miles from the jutting cliffs of Russian Siberia—along the icy fence of the DEW (Distant Early Warning) Line of America's northernmost air defenses and then due north across the snow fields of the Arctic and a final dash for the North Pole at the "top of the world."

This is the rugged course for the second timely installment of "High Adventure with Lowell Thomas" CBS Television, 9 p.m., on Monday, December 23.

Plunging into the land of the midnight sun and into the wastelands of an area which has lured men of iron will and high courage for decades, Thomas and his band of explorers have captured on film the awesome and incredible polar regions of the Arctic.

This land of frozen tundra and floating ice-fields has now become, in the opinion of military experts, the logical background where any future global war may be won or lost.

With the possibility of Rus-

sian ICBM's (Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles) being fired from Siberian rocket bases it will be up to the Air Force's northern defenses to warn and protect the North American continent from sudden destruction.

"High Adventure" will tell the story of the never-ending fight of man over the elements and the modern problems of logistics of our Arctic defense perimeter.

Living real-life adventure with Lowell Thomas and his son, Lowell Jr., television audiences will see navy frogmen working in underwater demolition squads—blasting ice flows loose with 18,000 pounds of dynamite.

At the Harding Icefields, Thomas' film crew photographed the daredevil work of the Air Force's "Parachuting Paramedics"—the gallant men who perform air rescue work by dropping down onto the ice floor, cut open by yawning crevasses, and haul to safety the crews of downed aircraft.

Near the edge of the Bering

Straits, "High Adventure" will visit Kotzebue Eskimos as they tend their nomadic reindeer herds.

As for "stars" of the second episode of the series, Thomas secured the services of three men who long ago wrote their names in the history books by their exploits in forging new trails in opening up the northern polar regions to modern habitation and exploration—Admiral Donald MacMillan, Sir Hubert Wilkins and Col. Bert Balchen.

Admiral MacMillan is the survivor of the first expedition to ever reach the pole (over 70 men have died in the attempt through the years). He made the journey by dog sled as he traveled with Admiral Peary in April, 1909.

Sir Hubert Wilkins, another veteran of the Arctic, was one of the first men to navigate a submarine in polar waters. Col. Balchen, a pioneer flyer of the north and aviation expert, helped open the Arctic to modern air concepts.

A fourth pioneer of "High Adventure," the heroic Dane Peter Freuchen, died of a heart attack soon after landing in Alaska with Lowell Thomas.

Nearly half of pedestrian deaths occur between 6 p.m. and midnight.

Lady Senator Outflies Sound

Senator Margaret Chase Smith (Rep.-Maine) became America's first woman legislator to fly faster than the speed of sound with a mach breaking orientation flight last week from Los Angeles International Airport in North American Aviation's supersonic two-place F-100F Super Sabre.

The diminutive, vivacious Senator from Maine is currently on active duty with the Air Force as a Lieutenant Colonel and is studying personnel problems at U.S. Air Force Bases throughout the country.

North American Aviation's Chairman of the Board J. H. Kindelberger was the first to congratulate Senator Smith as she stepped from the rear cockpit of the sleek Super Sabre which was piloted by U. S. Air Force Maj. Clyde Good, a veteran combat pilot in World War I and Korea who currently is the Air Force's Assistant Plant Representative at North American's Los Angeles Division.

Major Good flew Senator Smith over the Pacific Ocean and mountainous terrain in the Southern California area at speeds which reached almost 1000 miles per hour. Exact performance data on the Super Sabre is classified but its maximum speed is rated in excess of 1000 miles per hour.

"I felt as if I were in my living room looking out the window at the ocean and mountains... it was a wonderful experience and it was difficult to believe that we were traveling at such a high speed the ride was so smooth," Senator Smith exclaimed.
