## El Camino College President Shot Flushes Announces Retirement in June 2 Burglars

Forrest G. Murdock, first and only president of El Camino Colege, announced to campus as-ociates this week that he will submit his resignation to members of the college Board of Trustees to take effect at the close of the present college year.

The veteran educator, "Mr. El Camino" to thousands within the community, was instrumental in the establishment of the college district and has watched the college grow from its origmal enrollment of 1100 in 1947 its current registration of 9600 students.

Dramatic announcement of his decision to retire was made at the annual Christmas luncheon of the college faculty Tuesday. In speaking to the instructors and fellow administrators, he said, "We appreciate the fact that we have such high quality instruction at El Camino Colege. In the years to come I nope that the college will grow and thrive, keeping in mind not only the worth and dignity of the faculty, but also the worth and dignity of others with whom Jose High school. we come in contact."

In leaving his position as president of the college and superintendent of the El Camino Junior College district, Murdock told co-workers on the campus hat he will retire from the active field of education following 42 years of experience in the public schools.
