One-In-A-Million 'Jim' LOCAL STORE ROBBED Nabbed by Detectives

And they did. After 17 days of intensive police work, detectives Myles Hamilton and Walter Nitz, working under the direction of Captain Ernest Ashton, tracked down their "Jim."

They arrested James R. Harris, 20, of 547 E. 223 st., Friday and held him on charges of robbing Arlis R. Braswell, 18, of \$24.50 at the point of a gun on December 6.

Braswell, a sailor attached to the U.S.S. Toledo, tied up. at Long Beach, had been hitchhiking on Pacific Coast hwy, the night of December 6. He told police that two young men had picked him up, and, after driving a short way, pulled over to the side of the highway in Torrance. The driver, Braswell said, poked a gun into his ribs.

This is a stickup," the driver said. "How much money do you have? Give it to me." Braswell told police he handed his wallet over to the driver, and stayed in the car until he was ordered out near a farm field.

Two days later, however, ond clue. Torrance detectives were called by San Pedro police. A young boy and his mother. San Pedro officers said had some information about the robbery. Hamilton and Nitz, assigned to the case by Captain Ashton, saw the mother and son and learned that the son had been involved in the robbery.

For two days, mother and son had been trying to find the sailor so that they could return some of the money that had been taken from him. Unsuccessful, they had finally turned to the police.

The mother said her son had related the story of the robbery to her when he had come home. The boy had been shocked by the crime. He had had no idea that his friend with whom he had gone for a drive was armed and planned a robbery.

While he described his companion to police, the boy had no knowledge of his friend's address or his last name. His companion was a chance acquaintance and was known to him only as "Jim."

That was the first clue Hamilton and Nitz had to work on. They began from there. They questioned the teen-ager further and learned

CHECK HOTELS Hamilton and Nitz began checking hotels in and around Torrance. In one hotel, they foung that a young man named Jim Harris had left a day earlier. He answered the description given them, and he drove the kind of car Braswell had described. That was their third clue.

With the full name of their suspect, Hamilton and Nitz began a careful check of other friends of the youth who had been with Harris. They questioned 30 to 35 young men and pieced together a more complete description of Harris.

A chance remark by one of the young men gave Hamilton and Nitz their fourth and final clue. The youth said he lived near Harris, and the detectives followed him home. For three days they watched the home occupied

by Harris' family.

On the fourth day, they arrested Harris and brought him to the Torrance Police Station to be confronted by Braswell and Harris' companion the night Braswell was robbed. The two identified Harris, and Hamilton and Nitz had their one-in-a milion Jim.


