

Southern California, since World War II, in addition to its fantastic population growth, has taken on all the problems which accompany such rapid growth. Not only are telephone, sewage and transportation facilities taxed to the limit, but especially agencies organized by local governments to cope with people in trouble, Such agencies, of course, include the public welfare bureau, the courts, the probation department and law enforcement.

California has undoubtedly one of the best judicial systems in the United States, LOS ANGELES COUNTY HAS THE LARGEST PROBA-TION DEPARTMENT IN THE UNITED STATES, Additionally, Southern California has been acutely aware of "juvenile delinquency," Consequently, this section of the country has been among the leaders in the assault on uvenile delinquency," with crime prevention being given more thought in the field of law enforcement.

Sheriff Biscailuz was one of the first law officers to recognize that police and sheriff's juvenile bureaus were in key positions insofar as real crime prevention work is concerned. It was his theory that it was not enough to locate and process through the juvenile courts or otherwise make disposition on juvenile offenders. He felt that in addition law enforcement general and juvenile bureaus in particular should make a concerted effort to anticipate and curb at its source the alarming increase in crime

The Field Service Unit of the Sheriff's Crime Prevention Bureau was organized in January, 1954, with the approach to the problem of crime prevention being handled at the community level. Accordingly, the Unit was divided into four categories, each with specific areas of responsibility. The four units are delinquency control, delinquency prevention, case disposition, and night juvenile patrol.

Some of the functions performed by Field Services are the assistance and guidance of youth who are interested in forming car clubs, the identification of gangs and their memberships, an expanded public speaking program with complete emphasis on school groups and the development of

There is nothing statistically to reveal cause for alarm in the de-linquency picture in Los Angeles County. Total figures concerning youth in trouble are on the STEADY INCREASE and detention facilities are always full. In proportion to the population, however, and upon consideration of the acute school-room shortage and the failure of other facilities to keep pace with population growth, delinquency here is not out of balance within

PUBLIC RECREATION AND YOUTH PROBLEMS by

"An ounce of preventive recreation is worth a pound of institutional rehabilitation.' The American Council to Improve Our Neighborhoods has done considerable research on problems of cities. One of the recent surveys of ACTION discloses that slums and blighted districts comprise about twenty cent of cities' residential areas but they account for thirty-three per

cent of the population and fifty-five per cent of the juvenile delinquency. Slums and blighted areas have their origins, in part, from poor planning for recreation and results are congested areas without space for leisure time relaxation and enjoyment. This provision of play space is a problem confronting ALL cities today and public recreation has become an artificial man-made substitute for the open areas and freedoms enjoyed by youth

have a safe place to play with recreation leadership provided to help them find socially accepted outlets for their leisure time and inquiring minds. These recreation areas and leaders insure that youth will be given adequate opportunity to learn the many good things which offset or stitute for the bad. Adequate public recreation programming insures that youth will have the opportunity and guidance to learn many new skills and techniques in sports, music, camping, aquatics, arts and crafts, drama, club activities, etc.

A recreational leader is not a police officer, but is a guide to a fuller, richer life for our youth. This leader is a positive factor in the healthy development of a youth's mental, physical, emotional, and spiritual growth. This leader is provided expressly to help the youth to fit into the modern,

complex culture of our urban areas. Most of today's parents will recall that they "got away with" many pranks in their youth that are now looked upon as undesirable actions of today's youth. The reason for this is readily apparent if parents also

Public recreation's important job in working with youth today is helping them to find the proper use of their leisure time/ Without adequate public recreation programs designed to meet the many myriad needs and wants of all types of youth in our cities, the problem of juvenile delinquency would soon be completely out of hand.

Depriving youth of expert leadership while he searches for "something to do" could only result in chaos, Exploration of life by youth requires leisure time guidance.
