

El Camino Students Vie For Office

Twenty-six El Camino College students have tossed their rooters' caps into the ring in proeration for elections to be conducted on campus January 13 and 14.

Offices for which the polls will open include posts in Associated Student government and those of the Associated Men and Women students. In charge of election procedures is Miss Lynne Smith, vice president of the Associated Students and recent princess in ECC Homecoling activities.

Two contenders have announced their candidacy for the office of student president. They are Carl Tate and Herman DeNunzio, both of Inglewood.

DeNunzio, is a graduate of Inglewood High School and a drafting major. During the past semesier, he has held the post of commissioner of athletics the Warrior campus. He is member of the Sigma Phi Kappa fraternity and is 20 years old.
