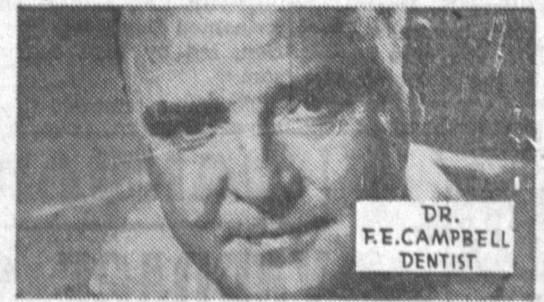

Rep. Cecil King Interviewed By League of Women Voters

An interview with Representative Cecil King was held recently by the League of Women Voters of Palos Verdes Estates. Speaking for the Palos Verdes League, a "local" League in the sense that membership includes women from Torrance and the South Bay area, were chairmen of committees directly interested in current legislation. Also present were Mrs. George Froisher, President of the Inglewood League of Women Voters, Mrs. David Post, Director of the South Area LWV of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Martin Malis, recording secretary of the Los Angeles City Board of the League of Women Voters.

Mr. King who was home during the Congressional recess, was accompanied by his executive secretary, E. L. Pummer. Mrs. Joseph Anfuso, Voters Service Chairman, asked what his current committee memberships were. Mrs. King is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, which precludes any other committee work, and which began work on tax revision on January 7.

In response to question from Mrs. Hubert Morehead, Legislative Chairman, on world trade and foreign aid, Mr. King expressed the feeling that the use of this country's economy and security must be based on operations abroad. He will work to extend the Reciprocal Trade Agreement Act and for U. S. membership in the Organization for Trade Cooperation. He is opposed to cutting foreign aid monies but feels that current emphasis on military spending will give opponents to foreign aid a firmer base to work from. He does not feel that more appropriations are necessary, however, since we can cut down on some conventional weapons expenditures, and will not vote to raise taxes unless he is more convinced that additional military expenditures are really required. He will fight to halt the decrease in U. S. contributions to the United Nations Technical Assistance Program.

Mrs. Richard Blakeley, Federal Loyalty and Security Programs Chairman, asked about changes in existing security programs. Mrs. King said that he felt a relaxing of the programs was very likely in the next session of Congress and that he has had a long record of opposition to a harsh and stringent interpretation of security measures, which has lost many good and talented people to the government. HIGHER EARNINGS PROVE ATTRACTIVE INCENTIVE IN NEW SAVINGS PLAN

Palos Verdes Federal Savings and Loan Association announced today a new savings plan whereby any individual who declares a will to save a stated amount each week or each month may qualify for extra bonus earnings of as much as 1% extra per year depending on how long he keeps up with the program.

The announcement was made by Robert H. Finch, president of Palos Verdes Federal, who declared that the "bonus savings plan" is new to a great many savers although it has been in effect at Palos Verdes Federal for about six months. "Although they know they can quit and go back to our regular savings program at any time, it is amazing how many people who try the plan stick to it," Finch said.

New Plan Rewards Systematic Savers

Finch pointed out that the plan originated as a method whereby those who save stated amounts weekly, monthly or annually over longer periods of time might be "rewarded" for such consistency with a choice of bonus earnings ranging from 3/4% to 1% per year. Palos Verdes officials said the bonus type account is popular especially with those saving for college funds, retirement, etc.

Both Types of Accounts Insured

Finch explained that the association, which operates under U. S. Government charter and supervision, provides insurance for each account up to \$10,000. "This includes our new bonus savings account, too," Finch said, "and withdrawal privileges apply to both."

The Accounting Department at Palos Verdes Federal also released statistics recently to show a substantial increase in the "save-by-mail" feature on all savings activities and specifically on bonus savings accounts.

The Board of Directors of Palos Verdes Federal at its last meeting declared a 4% current annual rate. The association pays its earnings 4 times each year to all its savings account holders.
