An Open Letter from the Director of the FBI: By J. EDGAR HOOVER

Warning to U.S. Teen-Agers I've spent 40 years, my whole career, dealing with the seamier side of robbery, kidnapping, gangsterism and murder. It is possible that the nation's youngsters think of me, when they think of me at all, as a pretty

Perhaps that's just as well, for I want to give the young people of America some friendly, fatherly advice, and I would like them to take it

The advice has to do with the sex-crime headlines in the newspapers today. These headlines worry everyone with any decency—they worry your parents and they worry you. And they certainly worry me, So I've worked up a list of ten "Ten-Age Tips" that I feel will help youg people to steer clear of danger. When you look them over you may say that some of them are only common sense. But remember that the common-

sense rule is often the one we're apt to forget. You'll also note that some of the "tips" apply only to girls. But rememfriend who needs his protection and advice, so he should study the whole list too.

In any case, these are the ten rules that, in my judgment and experience, are the most important.

### (Continued Next Week) Lets' Find The Answer

On opening my paper the other evening I was greeted with the headline "Youth Narcotics Ring Broken Up." It brought to mind newspaper stories that have appeared in our local papers in the past few months: Teen Age Group Organizing to Secure Teen Age Center", "Recreation Bond Defeated", "Torrance Slated for Juvenile Hall". One begins to ask questions. What is the world coming to? Is that your reaction? Do you stop there or do you try to do something about it?

I tried to find some answers. To start with, I walked out of my office to the parking lot, and found a group of young men lounging on and among the parked cars. I asked them why they were there, what they were wait ing for and where they were going when they left there. They answered: "There is no place else to be." "We are waiting for someone to come along and tell us about a party that we can go to," with no explanation as to what kind of party. "We don't know where we are going when we leave

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here." I asked them if they would be interested if I told them where they might find a Teen Age Center. Their faces lit up like dawn, but immediately fell because they knew there was no Teen Age Center in Torrance.

These boys and girls of whom I speak are not the ones who join the Y's or the Scouts. They are not Little League material and never have been, nor are they the kind that join the regularly accepted Teen Age Clubs. They are some of the vast number of boys and girls who have never excelled in any one thing. They are the outsiders. They are the ones who have never proven to anyone, most important, not even to themselves, that they are some-

"Idle hands are ever weary, idle hearts are never cheery", so chanted my Grandmother. We preach at them to do something, to keep busy, then supply nothing fo them to do. There are no small jobs for which you can hire a teen-ager. They are not adults and should not be expected to do an adult job. We should give them a chance to learn responsibility

A child's first love is for its parents, because it sees the works of its parents. Parents are the suppliers and comforters. Children should be taught to love God. We say they must love God. Then we cover the visual evidence of God's work with man-made creations. How can a little child understand the wonders of God's creations from a man-made picture. We cover ou fields with asphalt, and cover that with jalopies. Let's save some open space, some places where a little child can see what God has wrought. It is not a far cry from an appreciation of the beauties and laws of nature to love and appreciation of the beauties and laws of God's great creation, our

A little child is trusting until he has been fooled a few times. Let us show them we respect the laws of God and man by respecting them. Who is to blame for the headlines? You and I. We made them. We are society. You who read this are interested in your community, in your country and the American way of life. Let us work a little harder to supply they play grounds, the recreation areas and the work experience necessary to create good citizens. People who can play and work together learn to live in peace together. Each person must know he contributes to the well being of the world. He is important as an individual. Let us stop trying to create the "hero" of the totalitarian and do something to promote the ordinary citizen of democracy. Let us not blame the parents, they need help and knowl-

In dollars and cents the cost of detection and punishment of one crime is far greater than the cost of a neighborhood playground. A Juvenile Hall is more expensive to build and maintain than the necessary recreation areas in Torrance. Let us be consistent. Let us do something to correct the conditions which make headlines.

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
