AN OPEN LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR OF THE FBI: WARNING TO U.S. TEEN-AGERS Don't invite trouble! Here are 10 rules that every parent

should make sure his youngster knows (Continued from Last Week) 1. If any stranger - or even a slight acquaintance - makes improper ad-

vances, tell your parents immediately. Young people are too often kind-hearted about such things—they dislike the idea of getting an offender into "trouble." Just remember that if you don't report him, he'll probably get into worse trouble later on-to say nothing of the harm he may cause.

2. If you know of any pornographic pictures or literature being passed

around, notify your parents immediately. Obscene Reading matter is a favorite habit of the degenerate. If the authorities can run down the source and trace the material, they may be able to rid the community of danger before it starts. 3. Know your date! Don't go out on "blind dates" unless another couple is

along—and even then be cautious. If someone phones and says he's a friend of Jack Jones, tell him you'd glad to have Jack Jones introduce him. 4. Stay out of "Lovers' Lanes."

It's natural to want to be alone with your date, but experience shows that "Lovers' Lanes" are favorite haunts of sex criminals, Don't wander away alone from the crowd at picnics and outings. Stay within calling distance. Sex criminals are easily attracted to any group of young people, and

given an opportunity they can strike with frightening speed. 6. Don't ask for trouble - dress sensibly. Provocative clothing may attract the attention of a potential sex 7. Be civil to strangers who ask directions, but never go part way with

The "directions" trick is a favorite among sex criminals. They count on the natural helpfulness of young people. 8. Be very careful about accepting work from a stranger.

This is another insidious dodge. Always make sure that the person respectable business man Don't go about the house half-dressed.
 This may seem harmless, but it's an invitation to "Peeping Toms"—

who may later become something more dangerous. 10. Never, never hitchhike! And never, never pick a hitchhiker up!

IS YOUR HOUSE A HOME?

We residents of Torrance, by nationwide comparison, can consider ourselves fortunate, in that most of our homes do not fall in the housing project category and that our community is relatively free of the blight of slums. Study of these two conditions by the Senate's Juvenile Delinquency Subcommittee pointed out that these two factors substantially increased the incident of juvenile delinquency. Here in Torrance we have homes with grass in the yard, easy to reach public playgrounds and parks, a new community swimming pool, and many civic minded groups who contribute their time and money to juvenile projects such as Boy and Girl Scouts, Little Leagues, Y.M.C.A., etc.

Yet in spite of this favorable picture of our city, we do still have juvenile delinquency. Why? First, it is erroneous thinking ot picture our playgrounds and parks as reform schools and harbor the false delusion that they can be a geneal panacea for a problem that is based in the home. One of the slogans used by Kiwanis Clubs throughout the nation, simply states, "WE BUILD." Reknown authorities have stated that one antidote to the juvenile problem is for the community to do all it can to develop a spirit in juveniles "to build" rather than to tear down. Torrance has and probably will always provide the necessary juvenile facilities and adult efforts, there is still the necessity for the juvenile to live in a HOME and not in just a house. It is all to frequent here in Torrance as elsewhere, that when the juvenile is in trouble his "biological" parents are both at their place of employment or playing bridge or golfing or at a bar, and the juvenile is strictly on his own. This gets down to the roots of the problem. Today's parents are victims of a social pattern and the children of such a family are its secondary victims. This situation exits in every level of society and is no respector of wealth, race or creed. So today's children who are the products of the "I" oriented parents do not have the help they could get from parents who should be family-centered, they tend to be mixed-up instead of part of a tightly knit family group, and have lost, as sociologists put it, "role and status,"

Since it is possible to recognize one of our failure in handling the juvenile problems, is there a substitute for the loss of a closely knit family? Yes, but a poor one, the help of people trained as psychologists, psychiatrists, and sociologists. These people can offer some chance of untangling our children's mixed emotion and help teach them "to build." Torrance at present has very meager facilities to offer in this field, but as a part of Los Angeles County, funds and assistance are available and it should be one of our goals in this fine community to see that our children have a "HOME" to live in, a God to worship, ample recreational facilities, and the help of people trained in the constructive development of young minds.
