Although it is expected that the incumbent citizen members of the board will be reappointed as commissioners, the new law will bar a councilman from sitting on the commision.

#### DRALE HITS RULE ON SELECTION

Mayor Albert Isen defended procedures for making city commission appointments and denounced charges that he was "dictatorial" as "petty politics."

He made his statement at Tuesday's City Council session when Councilman Nickolas O. Drale asserted that commission appointments should not be made by one man or a majority of the council.

"Before I make a nomination for an original appointment, I always wait a week between the nomination and the actual appointment," Isen said.

The Mayor stated that only when a commissioner is up for a reappointment to a post he has held in the past, does he make the appointment the same

"I object to commission members being appointed by the Mayor only," Drale protested. "He has too many dictatorial powers now to suit me."

The hassle broke out after the Park and Recreation Commission submitted a resolution calling for the appointment of
