

Smog Fight . Help Asked By Kuchel

U. S. Senator Thomas H. Kuchel of California today urged widespread participation by both industry and government in a scheduled conference on air pollution to be held under the spon sorship of the U.S. Public Health

Service later this year. In a speech to the Senate renewing his campaign for concerted action to end "smog". Senator Kuchel related that much progress has been registered in tracking down and controlling sources of pollutants but stated more aggressive efforts must be made to complete removal of "aerial sewage" from the atmosphere of America's metropolitan areas.

Recalling that he sponsored the five-year law under which Federal agencies are assisting in the campaign against smog, Kuchel declared that air pollution is a product of the Nation's growth and increasing motorization and industrialization. He cited authorities which have warned that unless prompt steps are taken to control pollution sources the damage and inconvenience will increase greatly and many cities now are on the "threshold" of serious smog conditions.

The jury-selected items to be displayed include jewelry, silversmithing, ceramics, woven and silk screen fabrics, mosaics, wood accessories, enamel, bookbinding, glass, tile and iron. Cosponsoring the exhibit with the museum is the Southern California Designer Craftsmen.

More than 850 items were submitted by craftsmen within a 125 mile radius of Los Angeles. Those selected to be displayed involve the work of 49 craftsmen from Los Angeles; 23 from Southern California; and 18 from the north.
