

WHAT NEXT?

Recently in Los Angeles County we were more startled by that "NEWEST KICK" our teenagers have discovered than we were by Russia's pronouncements.

Our teenagers, quite naturally, with their inquisitive minds seek new things and many times trouble follows.

According to the sheriffs office in the eastern part of our county some teenagers found a manner by which they could get a "KICK" and really cheap. Just ten cents buys a tube of glue. This vicious little tube is used by the teenagers to inhale the benzene fumes for exhilirating effects. It is a model airplane glue.

There will, of course, always be juvenile problems as long as mankind exists, but possibly are the problems increasing? Yes, with the faster pace of our daily life, the reduction of physical activities and shortcuts made possible in our daily routines, we find the youngsters with more time to expend in activities which always pose a problem. Some of the problems which the younger iolks have to face are not of their own doing, but on the insistance of the adults of the community and the homes. The community by virtue of growth has removed considerably the experiences so necessary for the ounger folks to sink their teeth in order to learn right from wrong, such as the lack of facilities for the kids to experience the rudiments of nature on an afternoon or Saturday outing in the nearby area. A young man learns a lot just roaming in unpopulated areas; he may get into minor devilment, but he is out where he can apply a clear head and solve difficulties and problems, but can he do this on a street corner or congested room with many opinions proposed? More than likely he will follow the easiest suggested route to reach satisfaction for these unsermountable problems. Along with the youth trying to make decisions and occu-pying his leisure time is his parents hustling to provide the means to provide the shortcuts to everday life so the youth has more time on his hands and then in return the parents haven't the time or patience at a day's end to give this youth the just time to help guide and lead him to the common solutions to these insurmountable problems he has. So the youth turns to youth for help and eventually the wrong suggestions or solutions come up and then we call him a juvenile delin-quent, all because the parents were too bus and unknowingly contributing to the reasons rather than to solutions to the questions and quest for knowledge of our youth.

Federal officials and Sheriffs officers say that this can result in deathor permanent injury to a youth. This addiction can cause asphyxiation and heart failure and a gradual breakdown resulting in death.

William Prillmayer, assistant chief of the Los Angeles office of the United States. Food and Drug Administration, explained that his office is powerless to halt the practice.

"It's a problem for the police and sheriff's office, "We have no jurisdiction because the fluid being inhaled is not a food, drug or cosmetic.

The only answer to this problem as all other problems of juvenile delinguency is in the home. Perhaps an old-fashioned kick should be administered to the parents of these young Americans.

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Our teenagers in recent years have been straying farther and farther from the family home in search of experience and adventure. True they must try their wings and seek the answers to their newly discovered problems of living, but will the get the right answers among their own group, their chance acquaintances, whose knowledge may be no more than their own? Hardly will be the majority develop other than in the pattern of their immediate group, leaving much to be desired at times.

I feel that a major contribution toward a solution is family unity. Activities to help absorb this energy and surplus time for which we have been able to provide for our youngsters.
