#### Notice Regarding Multi-Message Unit Charges in the Los Angeles Extended Area

The increase in multi-message unit charges authorized by the decision of the Public Utilities Commission of the State of California effective January 20, 1958, will be subject to refund if the decision is annulled by court of competent jurisdiction (Possible refunds would apply initial period message unit calls of five units or more, and to some ini tial period calls of three or four Retunds in no case would amount to more than one message unit on the initial period rate. Re funds may also apply to the additional period charges on some of these calls.) The Company will maintain the necessary records to make such refunds possible except customers using coin box telephones in the area affected may claim refunds provided they maintain the following information

1. Telephone number from which you made the call.

2. Telephone number you called, 3. Date and time of day,

4. Amount deposited in coin box and further except that customers using telephones located in hotel rooms in the area affected may claim refunds from the telephone company provided they maintain the following information:




