

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTS

for the United States (Released September 26, 1957)

More major crimes occurred in the United States during the first half of 1757 than in any like period in the past. Police reports reflecting an 8.4 percent increase brought the national total of major crimes tc 1,399,670 at the midyear point.

By June 30, the estimated total criminal homicides and assaults, robberies, burglaries, and other thefts exceeded the average for the preceding five years by 24.4 percent.

Increases occurred in all crime classifications, and particularly note-

worthy is the fact that robberies increased for the first time since 1957. Since first compiled in 1951, midyear crime estimates have increased 45.7 percent, which is 4 times the 11 percent increase in population in the same period.

Submitted by Joe Wilcox, Executive Secretary, YMCA of Torrance I'd like to discuss some of the positive factors related to juvenile delinquency here in Torrance and on the American scene.

We have a problem.

It is a human tendency to generalize about that which we do not understand. And all adults have trouble understanding the younger generation. Generalizations about the kids of our community cannot be fair appraisals of the tens of thousands of individual human beings, each with their unique personalities, interests, needs, attitudes, habits, and problems. Even Cicero complained about "that new and wild generation" thousands of years ago.

The great efficiency of the Torrance Police Department, and Lt. Cook's fine Juvenile Division, magnifies in our minds the number of youthful wrongdoers we have. Let us thank God for the training and understanding that our local force have, in working with those who break a law in

The greatest area of misunderstanding between youth and adults today lies in the accelerated maturation of present day youngsters. Sixteen year olds today are much older than 16 year olds were ten years ago. If you have opportunity to break through youth sound barrier, as we sometimes do in our YMCA Clubs and Camps, you hear amazingly sound and mature ideals, plans, goals, and standards from our local youngsters. The kids are are aware of the many demands society will place upon them in the near future. They are thinking and preparing for service life, college, job training and competition. They have developed a philosophy of life far in advance of many elders they associate with daily living. Given long enough around a camp fire, how and girls will be sharing serious thoughts about around a camp-fire, boys and girls will be sharing serious thoughts about God and fair play. With so many somber predictions of missile warfare, recessions, etc., the youth of today are forced to become mature faster.

We've discussed how the juvenile problem is in some ways magnified to a point of hysteria when our youthful citizens are misunderstand for one reason or another,

The Police Department operates the excellent TAPS program of fun and training. The Torrance School District does a magnificent job of counseling with troubled kids before real trouble developes. We who work with youth are so grateful for the excellent program of the Torrance Recreation Department. Its daily programs are imaginative and capture the interests of thousands of youngsters, not just to "keep off the streets" which is really negative thinking, but aiding youngsters to use creative talents and energies to learn new skills. And fair play is the greatest lesson the department teaches, rather than just proficiency in a given sport. And, finally, let us remember the thousands of understanding volunteers who work with youngsters in behalf of churches, Boy Scouts, YWCA, Girl Scouts. Woodcraft Rangers, Sportsmen's Clubs, Campfire Girls, Rod and Gun Clubs, and the Torrance YMCA. Without their sacrificial giving of time and energy to the youth of Torrance, our city would be over-run with bored, uninspired, and trouble-aimed youngsters.

In the "Y" our Ideal is Christ, and we feel that His teaching points the way for our work with youngsters. If we will strive to love, accept, and understand these young people, we can work constructively with them as they prepare for future adulthood.
