New members: Jim Munson was from Loma and Dr. Francis Clark from San Pedro.

New members will become acquainted with the multiple functions of Community Chest area boards on March 12 when the Installation Banquet will be held at 6:30 p.m. in the Granada Hotel.

The Harbor Area Board is one of the five Associated Cities Community Chest Boards. To them falls the responsibility for providing leadership during the annual Chest drive, the operation of the Chest Service Center in each area, and to elect area representatives to Budget Committees, the Federation Board of Directors.

"Through the action of its Board, the residents each area can be assured that funds raised in their own area receive the most careful stewardship," said J. A. Robinson who will continue to act as Board Chairman for the next term.

Braille Speaker To Address Optimist Dinner

Harold Massie, president, Torrance Optimist Club announced Frederick J. Pymm, Braille Institute representative, will address the group at its 7 p.m. dinner Monday in the Palms Restaurant, 1925 West Carson St.

Erave Figueredo, program chairman, says Pymm, a resident of Huntington Park who long has been interested in work for the blind, will describe modern methods to rehabilitate sightless adults of the Los Angeles County area.

Pymm will show that all services at the Institute are free to the blind, for it is financed by philanthropic contributions and bequests in wills.

These services, he says, consist of recreation, general education, social welfare, free white canes, vocational rehabilitation, job placement, printing and library of Braille and talking books.

Mayor Candidate Ruled Ineligible

One candidate for Torrance mayor was knocked out of the running Monday when City Clerk A. H. Bartlett officially notified John B. Feltes that he is not eligible to run.

Bartlett said that the candidates nomination papers did not contain the required five signatures, and that the candidate himself was not registered to vote until after he circulated his petition.

The city clerk explained that Feltes did not vote in a previous election and that his name had been removed from the voters list. He registered on February 13, after his petition had been circulated, Bartlett said.

Feltes, of 4624 W. 166th st., described himself as a caster.

The candidates disqualification leaves only four candidates in the running for the city's top elective post.

They are incumbent Albert Isen, Councilman Nicholas O. Dralc, Walter G. Ryan and Dearl Craft.
