Youngsters need love and security. The boy or girl who finds warmth in his own home and acceptance in his community rarely if ever gets into trouble with the law. It is when either the home or the community, or both, fail, that problems develop.

Twenty billion dollars annually is spent in the United States to fight crime, a staggering sum. The overwhelming majority of persons in adult penal institutions started as juvenile delinquents.

For every dollar we have been spending on education, nationwide, we pay \$1.29 to support "our army of criminals" for every dollar spent on churches, we pay \$12 for crime.

In the problem of juvenile delinquency, prevention is more important than treatment. In the long run, it is also less costly. Correction and rehabilitation are important, of course, but forethought and careful planning would minimize the need of facilities for the handling of youngsters AFTER they have come in conflict with the law.

sponsible for 66 per cent of auto thefts, 52 per cent of burglaries, 40 per cent of all thefts, and 21 per cent of robberies.

Every time a juvenile commits a crime, there has been a failure in human resources. It is said that 80 per cent of possible future delinquency can be detected at the end of the second year in grammar school. Responsible public officials are looking for solutions in long range planning.

Remember: As J. Edgar Hoover states, "Juvenile delinquency is a 'misnomer.' It is parental delinquency."
