Supervisor Hahn **Against Drain Bond Issues**

Although approved by the voters in 1952 as a few year program, the \$179 million bond issue program is still 30 per cent from being completed, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn warned this week in announcing his skepticism of the wisdom of submitting another bond issue for storm drains.

The 1952 program included a total of 140 projects, of which 76 have been completed, and 20 are now under consttuction. Contracts completed or awarded represent \$95.5 million of the total

The estimated construction costs of the drains not yet built amount to \$70 million. This figure includes 45 projects and 6 partial projects.

The partial projects, Supervisor Hahn explained, resulted from splitting up some of the large jobs into two or more pro-

"I am very doubtful of the advisability of asking the people to vote approval of a \$217 mil. lion bond issue where there still remains so much to be completed under the 1952 program," Supervisor Hahn declared.

During the past few years great changes have taken place in our city, and the name of Torrance has become known all over the United States. Not only as an industrial center, but also as a good place to live and work.


