Major Park The committee gave four possible sites for a major park in South Torrance: These are 1. At Madrona ave. and 236

2. At 229th st. and Avis ave. 3. At 230th st. and Ocean ave. 4. A site located in Redondo Beach, west of the city limits, and south of Sepulveda blvd. For a neighborhood park in South Torrance, the committee suggested a site in Victoria

out, however that this site is presently inaccessible. North Torrance Two sites were suggested for North Torrance. These are the southeast corner of Maple ave.,

and Carson st., and at 231st st. and Pennsylvania ave. In North Torrance, two possibilities were recommended. The first is on 171st st. south of the Evelyn Carr School, and the other is at 182nd st. and Yukon

In his report, Morris poi out that construction of the San Diego Freeway will isolate Mc-Masters Park from easy access from the south.

He did point out that with passage of the bond issue, the northside will be well taken care of in the immediate future.

New Parks A 25-acre park site will be acquired at Crenshaw blvd. and 190th st., and smaller sites 186th st. and Prairie ave., at 166th st. and Arlington, as well as development of Guenser Park on 178th st., between Arlington and Western aves. The study was made after the City Council rejected a former proposal for a 40-acre park in the flooded Walteria Lake area.





"This is written with a real sense of hopelessness. . . . Last Tuesday the Torrance City Council met to vote on a compulsory rabies inoculation law . . . and a City Father named Nicholas O. Drale, who led Council opposition to the ordinance, explained his stand with the incredible statement:

"'I talked it over with my dog and he told me he doesn't want to be shot."

"I wonder if this WOULD-BE COMEDIAN took the trouble to ask any children if they wanted to be bitten by a rabid dog?"

Fortunately for us all, and especially for our children, who are the most common victims of rabid dog attacks, the inoculation ordinance was passed and is now law. We have had no cases of rabies in our community since. Recently, the State of California adopted similar humanitarian laws.
