Greek Orthodox Holy Week Ends Saturday in Midnight Service

Greek Orthodox Church Holy Week started Thursday in Redondo Beach for members of the recently incorporated church (Dec. 11, 1957), with the service called "Do Deka Evangelia."

The Thursday service depicts the Lord on the Cross, crucified, and the event of his removal from the cross, in white, for burial.

Friday presented the "Epitaphio" (Epitaph), the grave of Jesus beautifully decorated with mounds of flowers.

At approximately 10:30 p.m., a small covered coffin, with a painting of Jesus Christ atop, was carried in a procession from the church, with priests, church officials and members leaving the church for a march representing the Spirit of Christ in the four corners of the world.

A communion service was held Saturday from 10 to 12 noon.

Midnight Service Beginning at 11 p.m. Saturday, members of the church gathered for the midnight resurrection service, "Christos Anesti" (Christ Has Risen).

Leading up to the Holy Week, the church has held Holy Mary services each Friday night since February 28.

It is the first time that Greek Orthodox services, especially for Holy Week, have been held in the area.

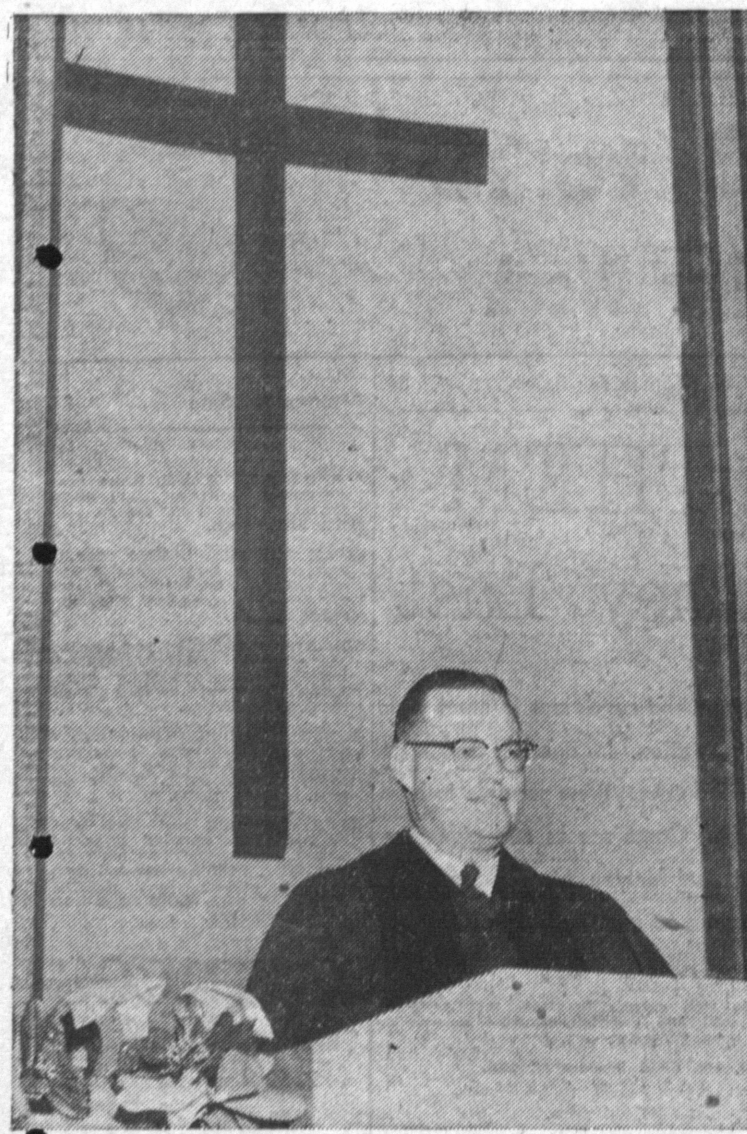

Nearly 2000 members and guests filled the newly constructed St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Easter Sunday in the three consecutive services. Over 700 attended the 9:30 service, 670, the 8:15 and the balance, the 11 a.m. services.

Workmen spent Saturday night putting the new pews in place for Easter and carpets are still to be laid.

Rev. Paul Cox, pastor, spoke at all services, on "The Joy of the Resurrection."

Seating capacity of the new church is 450 in the nave, 58 in the choir and 140 in the balcony although Sunday's services crowded more into the pews.

Communicant members of the church number 1242 and there are 1200 enrolled in the Sunday School department. Torrance residents account for almost 40% of these, Redondo Beach having the only larger percentage in the membership.
