

It commenmorates the anniversary of the movement started in 902 in a Boston slum when Dr. Edgar J. Helms, then a young Methodist minister on his first assignment, inaugurated a plan of self-help and cooperation to give his poorer parishioners "not charity but a chance."

Mexico, there are 122 autonomous non-denominational Goodwill Industries, devoted to providing employment, job training, and other rehabilitation services

to handicapped people.
Established locally in 1929 as branch of the Los Angeles organization, the Goodwill Indusries of Long Beach and the Harbor area was incorporated as a separate r-profit unit in 1939 with 54 employes. Local policies are made by a board of which Dr. W. Glenn Cheney is president and Walter L. Case, executive director.
