
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

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Call Bids for Two Schools

Plans were approved and bids asked for two new schools by the Torrance Board of Education Tuesday night. The new buildings will be Lincoln Ele-mentary School, 166th and Ar-lington and Columbia School for the Handicapped, to be built on the El Nido site.

Lincoln School, which will cost an estimated \$465,000, will contain 13 classrooms, two kindergarten units, music building, nultipurpose unit, and administration building. When opened next spring, it will relieve the double session problem at Casimir School.

Columbia School will cost an estimated \$325,000, with eight classrooms, multipurpose unit, and administration building. The school will be used to teach exceptional children from Torrance and other districts cooperating in the Southwest Cooperative

Special Education program. The Southwest program pro vides schooling for children with various handicaps, and each dis-trict provides facilities for one




