

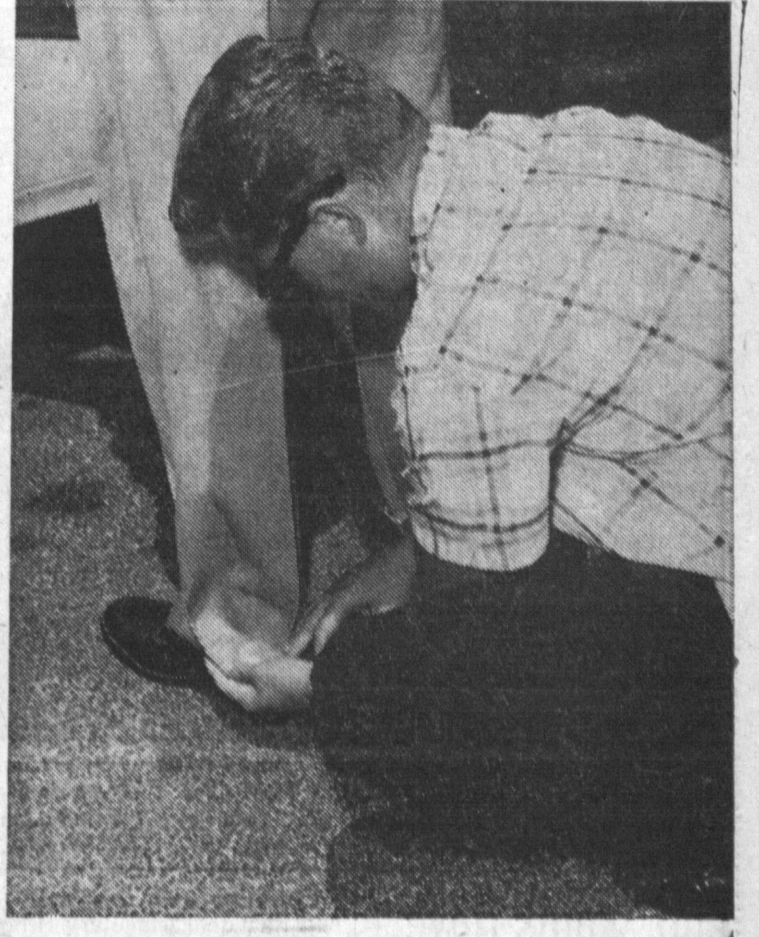

Canadian Air Force Gets Jet from Torrance Plant

The first Ryan Aeronautical Company Firebee jet target drone acquired by a foreign military service was delivered to the Royal Canadian Air Force at the company's Torrance division today.

The gleaming remote-controlled, high-speed drone is the forerunner of a substantial number of U. S. Navy-type KDA-4 Firebees ordered by the RCAF for testing and evaluating its present and future weapons systems at Cold Lake, Alberta, a major weapons firing range. Deliveries will be made from the Firebee assembly lines at Torrance, with shipment by rail to Canada. Carrying the RCAF maple leaf insignia, the first Firebee was presented to a group of RCAF officers, headed by Squadron Leader W. A. Speck, Rear Adm. Truman J. Hedding, western district Bureau of Aeronautics General Representative, led a Navy delegation and Bruce Smith, vice president-engineering and military relations, was in charge of the Ryan group at the ceremonies.

At Cold Lake, the Firebees will be air-launched from British Lancaster heavy bombers of World War II fame, specially modified for this purpose.
