Epileptics Hit By Recession

"Recession has hit the epileptic harder than perhaps any other group of handicapped persons," according to Hugo Ries, president of the Los Angeles County Epilepsy Society. "An epileptic who has one or two seizures a year and so loses one or two jobs a year, is truly dependent about his chances of employment."

Ries said that many of the calls to the social worker of the Los Angeles County Epilepsy Society are from epileptics who have been "forced underground." In the past, they have taken jobs without revealing that they are affected by this common neurological disorder, only to lose them after a seizure.

Torrance Girl Stops in N.Y. on Way to Greece

(Editor's Note: Miss Wills, a Torrance High School student, was selected as an exchange student and is visiting Greece this summer. She will write of her impressions of the trip from time to time.)

Hi Everybody!

Well, here I am in New York! The first lap of my journey having been completed, I have spent the last few days visiting friends in Manhattan.

The plane trip east to Idlewild Airport was very smooth except for about a half an hour of roller coaster ups and downs resulting from a storm further north.

Before that, however, there were many days of rushing around trying to accomplish everything necessary to insure a safe, quick trip. Among these preparations were applying for a passport, receiving no less than five shots, purchasing gifts for my two Greek families, packing my two suitcases, which, believe me, was quite a feat, and,

finally, after several hectic moments, stepping calmly into the plane accompanied by my 39 pounds of luggage, for probably the greatest adventure of my life.

My arrival in New York took place at 3:15 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time, June 25. Following a slightly sleepless night, I proceeded to explore New York.

First on the agenda was a trip around Manhattan on the Day Line launch. During the three hour trip around the island I was treated to such sights as the Chrysler Building, RCA Building, Yankee Stadium, Central Park, Brooklyn Navy Yard, Governor's Island, Ellis Island, and the Brooklyn, Queensborough, and George Washington Bridges.

After that, I visited the Empire State Building and Liberty Island, home of the Statue of Liberty, where I climbed 22 flights of stairs to the very top of her crown, for a most impressive view of the New York skyline.

The United Nations Building, flying flags of every nation represented, lent a splash of color to the tour.

30 Rockefeller Plaza, the location of the Greek Consulate, was next on my list. There I learned some more about the customs of the country I shall soon see.

Then last but not least, I visited the famous corner of Broadway at 42nd st., known to most as Times Square. There I stopped long enough to see the latest movie, "The Vikings," at the Astor Theater.

Tomorrow I shall start the second lap of my journey, flying from New York to Athens, Greece. From there I shall travel to Patras and the home of my foster parents.

I wish all of you could be there to enjoy the fun and excitement, but I shall try to keep you informed about all the events through future articles.

Record Building Program by L. A. School District

The Los Angeles City Schools classroom building program—already the nation's largest—reached a new record high during the 1957-58 school year which ended Monday, the City Board of Education was told at its annual meeting.

A total of \$60,128,000 was expended for new construction since July 1 of last year, the Board was informed by Associate Superintendent Virgil Volla, head of the system's building program.

The new record total includes \$4,736,760 for purchase of new land, \$49,013,537 for raw construction and equipment, \$2,734,977 for alterations and improvements, and \$3,642,706 for improvement of grounds.
