The foundation, started by arents, is a non-profit group corporated under state laws. Finances come from the parents of retarded children, donations of well-wishers and civic organizations.

Three Objectives Objectives are to operate a traniing center with educational, recreational and vocational habilitation facilities, to improve legislation for mentally handicapped persons, and to assist in ucating parents and the public mental retardation. Everything is done at the school to train the child to the fullest extent of his ability instead of letting him become a life-long burden to his family and the public.

The foundation does not shut its doors to parents unable to pay tuition for their children. Instead they raise the necessary coney through projects such as coming Bar-B-Que.


