### Lioness Club Has Social Evening

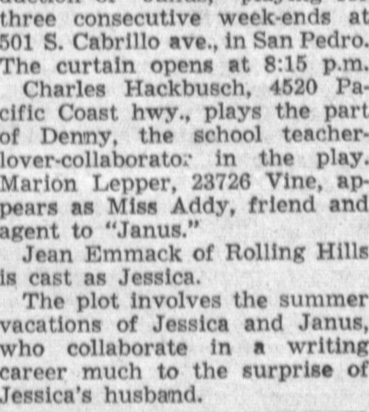
First social meeting of the new season was held by Torrance Lioness Club recently in the home of Mrs. Dale Harter. Mrs. Al Isen was co-hostess.
